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Message from the President Randall Cook

The Royal Life Saving Society NT Branch continues each year to grow stronger and is always striving to achieve its mission of preventing loss of life and injury in the aquatic environment and promoting safe participation in water related pursuits. I am very pleased to report to members, partners and supporters that the 2014/2015 year was a successful year in the delivery of our services and a challenging year as we seek to establish a permanent headquarters in Darwin.

The NT Branch continues to strengthen in every facet of its operations. Throughout the 2014/2015 year the NT Branch issued an amazing 21,752 certificates, including 14,135 from the Swim and Survive program and 6,529 training certificates.

The NT Branch has proven its capacity as the peak body for water safety training and education and remains fixed to its cause of drowning prevention. I am pleased to say that we have a very strong strategic plan — "Our People, Our Lifestyle, Our Water 2011-2016", and our organisation continues to build strong community relationships that ensures courses, programs and drowning prevention strategies are delivered to communities throughout the NT whether they are in urban, rural or remote areas.

Royal Life Saving NT have participated in 80 community events, ranging from Community displays, Active Family Fun Days, Mothers groups and school fetes and over 23,327 Territorians have received a direct community benefit from these activities.

I am pleased to advise that the NT Branch continues to forge strong partnerships with industry and works in collaboration with Pool Managers; with Government through the various Departments of Sport and Recreation, Local Government, Health, Family and Community Services, Education and Training; with the Education Sector through Primary, Middle and Senior schools, with like training providers such as AUSTSWIM; and of course with the community in general throughout the various health promotion initiatives and community development programs.

Report from the Executive Director

The number one focus for Royal Life Saving NT is drowning prevention strategies specific to the needs of our community. We remain true to our Mission and Vision which are critical to keep our community safe. Sadly, 13 people drowned in this reporting year and the Northern Territory maintains the highest drowning rate, per capita, in Australia.

In 2014/15 we celebrated 50 years of service with an Awards ceremony at Government House and we were very proud of our Member Ray Menhinnitt OAM who received the Order of Australia medal on the Queen's Birthday. Sadly, we mourned the loss of our Member Rick Berry whose life was tragically cut short while working at a remote community pool. Our Members are our future and this year we had 1,497 active members. We conducted 80 community events reaching 23,327 people. Royal Life Saving NT provided a direct community benefit and services to 52,600 people across the northern Territory.

12,669 primary school aged children from 100 schools participated in the Swim and Survive program, with 855 achieving the national benchmark of level 4. While participation numbers have increased, the number achieving a level 4 and above has decreased with 3% of enrolled students achieving the National Benchmark. Royal Life Saving NT are deeply concerned about these statistics and have launched a petition to call on Government to fund the Swim and Survive Program for Primary School students in years 4,5 and 6.

2,831 children from 38 remote communities participated in the Remote Swim and Survive project. The project enabled children to learn to swim and participate in a Pool Lifesaving carnival. The project has implemented a training and AUSTSWIM mentoring program to assist local people in obtaining employment or volunteer services at their community swimming pool. 222 local community people participated in this training.

6,529 training certificates were issued with 56% of this training conducted in regional and remote areas. 2,240 statements of attainments were issued under Vocational Education and Training. 314 Training courses were conducted over the NT and we partnered with Royal Life Saving Tasmania from August to December 2014 with 1088 Certificates issued including 1000 statements of attainment.

The NT Government funded Water Safety Awareness Program provides a fantastic opportunity for families to access free water safety lessons for their child. This year a record breaking 3,024 enrolments were received with seventeen providers operating across the NT. 14,990 children have participated in this program since inception and the Government have extended the program for Learn to Swim Vouchers.

The Sport of Pool Lifesaving achieved increased participation with over 3,000 children participating in carnivals in Darwin, Katherine, Alice Springs, Tennant Creek and remote communities. Royal Life Saving NT sent a team of six lifesaving athletes to the Australian Pool Life Saving Championships in Tasmania. We placed 7th overall, a fantastic achievement. Thanks to our coaches, volunteers and officials whose ongoing commitment and contribution to the sport makes a huge difference for our community.

The major challenge for Royal life Saving NT is securing a Headquarters in Darwin. The society has been operational for 50 years and our number one focus has been on drowning prevention. The shared sports tenancy at Sports House enabled us to focus on the community without the financial burden of commercial rent. Unfortunately this model no longer exists and we are moving to Ludmilla Primary School as a short term solution. Thank you to the Department of Education for assisting us in this difficult time. We continue to work with all levels of Government and Communities to seek a long term solution.

I am pleased to complete my report by advising members, stakeholders and supporters that the NT Branch is in a strong position and looks forward to the ongoing challenges. I would like to sincerely thank our devoted volunteers including the Executive Management Team led by Randall Cook, our trainers, instructors, examiners and our members. I would like to thank Royal Life Saving National Office and all the State and Territory Branches of Royal Life Saving. Finally I would like to thank the fantastic staff for their continued dedication and commitment. I am proud and honoured to be part of a fantastic team that is strengthened by and committed to our values of: Integrity, Respect, Quality and Leadership.

Highlights of the Year 2014/2015

- 12,669 school-aged children participated in the Swim and Survive program from 100 schools, with 855 students achieving the National Water Safety Competency Benchmark of a level 4 or above. 79 Government schools representing 8,911 students participated in Swim & Survive with 354 achieving level 4 and above. 14,135 children participated in the Swim & Survive program from 6 months 18 years of age.
- 2,831 children participated in the Indigenous Sport and Active Recreation Project Remote Swim & Survive from 37 schools in 26 remote locations.
- Increased participation initiatives of lifesaving services and programs throughout the Northern Territory, with over 3,000 children participating in Pool Lifesaving
- 314 courses were conducted across the NT, for 1887 participants, with of 6,529 certificates issued for 56% of training was conducted in regional and remote areas. 2,240 statement of Attainments were issued from the VET sector.
- 80 public awareness and community displays were conducted across the NT with 23,327 Territorians receiving a direct community benefit from these activities.
- Managed the Water Safety Unit for the NT Government, updated the NT Water Safety Strategy and implemented the new Pipes and Drains Campaign
- Enrolled 3,024 children under five in the Water Safety Awareness Program, developed to help families prevent drowning in this vulnerable age group.
- Maintained 29 Keep Watch Ambassadors and worked with all levels of Government to highlight the importance of water safety and prevent drowning
- Representative team from the Northern Territory placed 7th in the Australian Pool Lifesaving Championships
- Celebrated 50 years of Royal Life Saving NT service in the Territory, recognising Daphne Read's Life
 Membership for Royal Life Saving, Ray Menhinnitt OAM Order of Australia Medal and remembering
 the great work of Rick Berry whose life was tragically cut short while working in a remote community
- Sadly 13 Territorians lost their lives in drowning related incidents and the NT continues to have the highest drowning rate per capita in Australia (2013-2014 figures).

Our Organisation

History of RLSSA NT

Royal Life Saving Society - Australia—Northern Territory Branch has a proud history of serving communities and individuals and is the leading water safety education and training provider in the Northern Territory. The NT formed a stand-alone Branch of the Royal Life Saving Society – Australia in 1965 and since then has played a critical role in reducing drowning deaths, particularly in under five-year-olds through raising water safety awareness and teaching children water safety and swimming skills.

Royal Life Saving Society - Australia—Northern Territory Branch believes that everyone can be a lifesaver. Through innovative training practices, such as e-learning courses, we are continuing to find new ways to serve our community and help Territorians develop the skills to save lives.

Our Mission: To prevent loss of life and injury in the community with an emphasis on the aquatic environment.

Our Vision: To build a healthy, strong and safe aquatic community through access to water safety education and training.

Strategic Statement

Royal Life Saving is a Public Benevolent Institution (PBI) dedicated to the saving of lives. We turn everyday people into everyday community lifesavers. We achieve this through education, training, sport and participation, health promotion, risk management, advocacy and research.

Aquatic Industry including public, commercial and private pools	Professionally audited swimming pools gives the aquatic industry confidence that any safety gaps can be identified and rectified before problems arise. Other safety swimming pool safety assessments include swimming pools in strata buildings, hotel, motel, camping grounds and school swimming pools. We also provide ongoing professional training to keep pool staff up-to-date and to develop a strong aquatic network.
Community members using fee for service training	This includes community members who undertake all forms of training with us — from First Aid to industry-specific courses such as the Pool Plant Operators Course.
Culturally and linguistically diverse individuals and communities	The Territory is home to a variety of cultural and linguistic groups, including Indigenous groups who speak a diverse range of languages and immigrant groups. We work to ensure our safety messages and programs are accessible to all groups regardless of their background.

Refugees and new immigrants	Reaching out to refugees and new immigrants is particularly important because they often haven't been exposed to large natural water bodies or swimming pools. When funding is available, we partner with the Melaleuca Refugee Centre to reach those most at risk.
Regional, remote and very remote communities	Our team had a close relationship with 18 remote and very remote community swimming pools across the Territory, as well as neighbouring out-stations. We provide programs, training, networking opportunities and professional advice onsite.

Our People

Executive Board and Governance

Royal Life Saving Society - Australia – NT has an entirely volunteer Board, who provide their skills, insights, time and commitment to the organisation. The Board of seven people meets a minimum of eight times annually and is elected by the membership at the annual general meeting held in Darwin. This meeting is open

to all financial members of the organisation and is held on the first Wednesday in September at 6pm, advertised in the NT News.

The Board consists of a Chairperson; a Vice-Chairperson; a Secretary; a Treasurer; the Executive Director; and two other committee members. Unless elected directly as a separate office holder, the Executive Director will be appointed to be the Association's Public Officer. The Board's powers and responsibilities are determined by the Associations Act, Royal Life Saving NT Constitution and the current Strategic Plan: Our People, Our Lifestyle, Our Water 2011-2016. The Board is aware of their role and the prescribed governance standards for not-for-profit organisations.

Our Lifestyle

Our Community

A crucial element of Royal Life Saving Northern Territory's activities is working with all Territorians to raise awareness and share water safety skills and knowledge, specifically to prevent drowning. As a public benevolent institution (PBI), public education and advocacy are at the core of our purpose.

In the past financial year Royal Life Saving Northern Territory has had an active involvement in 80 community events at schools, shopping centres, parenting groups, remote communities and major Northern Territory events including Water Safety Week, Teddy Bears Picnic, Sea Breeze

Festival, Families Week, Children's Week and the Defence Expo. This is a 7% increase on the events attended in the previous year. These events have taken place right across the Northern Territory. Over 23,300 members of the community directly interacted with Royal Life Saving Northern Territory at these events. This demonstrates the commitment and dedication of the volunteers of Royal Life Saving Northern Territory to drowning prevention in our community.

Over the past year many of the community events have involved promoting and educating families about the Water Safety Awareness Program and the Keep Watch message. These programs are designed specifically to reduce drowning risks in young children. Parenting groups are a great way for the organisation to inform parents and carers of young children about these programs as access is free in these forums.

2014/2015 has seen an increase in involvement with community events hosted by the City of Darwin and the City of Palmerston. Some of these events include attendance at the City of Darwin Funbus events, Children's Week & Families Week. The City of Palmerston hosted the Palmerston Festival and the Kat Indoors Program. Working in partnership with both Councils has proven to be most successful for not only the Councils and Royal Life Saving NT, but also the Community at large. Attendance at these events has offered greater access to more members of our Community to the Organization' services.

The Swim and Survive Team also contributed with their involvement in school water safety talks. These proved very popular among the schools who took up this opportunity, the talks were a great lead into the schools Swim and Survive programs. These talks were also increased as the Pipes and Drains campaign was launched in December 2014. Customised Pipes and Drains talks were delivered to 1720 students across the Northern Territory in a two week period.

"Water Safety Week" was a great week the highlight of the week being Splashfest, the Royal Life Saving NT Stall was staffed by volunteers who donated their time to hand out information bags to over 200 families. Members of the public enjoyed "having a go" at CPR and rescuing a friend safely from the water.

Our Volunteers

Pool Lifesaving also benefitted from volunteer assistance throughout the year with Fritz Risler and Alister Lear continuing to support Darwin Pool Lifesaving and Peter Tonkin has been a great support to Pool Lifesaving in Alice Springs. In addition to community events board members donate their time to provide

strategic assistance; with over 100 hours were donated to the Organisation to ensure the operations plan aligned to the budget and strategic plan.

As a volunteer organisation, Royal Life Saving Northern Territory is very fortunate to be associated with amazing people who are willing to donate their valuable time to spread the water safety message. Since 2010/2011 an individual has been recognized for their outstanding commitment to the community. The 2014/2015 Volunteer of the Year Award is Bradley Mortimer. Brad has contributed many hours as a board member providing strategic assistance to the Board and the Organisation since joining the Board in April 2012.

Royal Life Saving NT have operated from Sports House for the past 30 years and for the last 2 years at Ethos House. This has enabled us to deliver services to regional and remote locations and truly service the whole of the Territory. The shared sports tenancy at Sports House enabled us to focus on the community without the financial burden of commercial rent. Unfortunately this model no longer exists and we are moving to Ludmilla Primary School as a short term solution. Thank you to the Department of Education for assisting us in this difficult time.

While Royal life Saving NT have continued to put money towards a building fund, we are still a long way off. We had a temporary solution at Ethos House until August 2015 and now another temporary solution at Ludmilla Primary School, thank you to the Department of Sport & Recreation and the Department of Education who assisted us during these difficult times. The Executive Board have developed a strategy to maintain services and to provide for a long term office / Head Quarters but this will really require a whole of membership drive to build the solution. Thank you to Daphne Read who is volunteering her time to assist the Executive Director to work with all levels of Government and Communities to seek a long term solution.

Training and Aquatic Services: RTO Provider Number 0859

Since 1894 Royal Life Saving has been training Australians to be lifesavers. While the principles have not changed, we are now training people to use these skills in a wide range of workplaces and communities. These programs are delivered by a professional group of employees and volunteers, providing customer-focused programs that foster training and skills that save lives and prevent accidents. Every year we train pool lifeguards, pool managers, teachers, swim teachers and first aiders in workplaces across the Northern Territory, many of them young and just starting a career. Training is the cornerstone of our vision for a safe community.

During 2014-2015, 314 courses were conducted with 6529 certificates issued including 2240 statements of attainment. RLSSA NT partnered with Royal Life Saving Tasmania to be the managing RTO for RLS Tasmania from August to December 2014. 1088 Certificates including 1000 statements of attainment were issued to participants within Tasmania. RLSSA NT has increased training delivered with a total of 56.05% of all training courses being delivered in remote and regional areas within the Northern Territory.

To ensure that course participants receive professional and concise training, Trainers are required to attend the Annual Trainers Workshop to re-accredit their qualifications and to validate assessment tools and procedures. The 10th Annual Trainers workshop was held in September and was a success with the majority of Trainers attending. This Workshop serves to ensure quality training and consistent practices are upheld and to ensure legislative requirements are being met and maintained.

In the past year we continued our development and expansion of vocational training and education agendas. Clarifying industry needs, supporting workforce development, whilst keeping a close eye on safety imperatives

that are essential components of our role in this area. Of specific importance was the review of units of competency contained within the Health Training Package and the Sports, Fitness and Recreation training package.

Aquatic Facility Safety Assessments

The increased demands on facility managers, duty supervisors and lifeguards to improve safety standards and keep abreast of industry best practice can be difficult. Royal Life Saving NT has annual (at least) meetings with the management of our 25 Public Swimming Pools to ensure our services are directly related to their needs and community safety. Industry feedback, ongoing consultation and active participation from all stakeholders is required to ensure our training is in line with industry needs. The formulation and implementation of risk management processes and workplace health and safety is essential to maintaining an efficient and safe aquatic operation. To assist aquatic facilities to achieve this, Royal Life Saving has delivered a range of Aquatic Risk Management Services:

- Aquatic Facility Safety Assessments
- Aquatic Facility Desktop Audits
- Guidelines for Water Safety Risk Assessments
- Water Safety Signage

The following Aquatic Facility Safety Assessments have been conducted

- 10 public swimming pools (6 remote pools, 4 urban pools)
- 1 public swimming pool risk assessment
- 1 public open water risk assessment



AUSTSWIM

The AUSTSWIM accreditation is the industry standard for Swimming and Water Safety Teachers™ and is delivered and recognised in each state and territory of Australia and many countries overseas.

Royal Life Saving Society NT work closely with aquatic facilities, education departments, peak industry organisations and partners to achieve the AUSTSWIM philosophy; that all Australians should have appropriate and relevant swimming and water safety skills and understand the principles and practices of water safety.

Royal Life Saving Northern Territory is a sub agency of AUSTSWIM. This allows Territorians access to consistent and quality courses. In 2014 – 2015 RLSSANT conducted a total of 17 courses, delivering to 162 participants across the Northern Territory. 2014-2015 Highlights included:

- 103 participants in the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety Course
- 38 participants in the AUSTSWIM teacher of Infants and Pre-schooler Aquatics
- 1 Laurie Lawrence Masterclass PD Workshop in Darwin with 21 participants
- 45% of the 17 Courses were delivered in Rural and Remote locations

AUSTSWIM Awards

This year saw nominations for the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming Safety Award and the Most Outstanding Contribution to AUSTSWIM Award. The 2015 NT AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety Award recipient is Brogen Begg from Katherine. Brogen has done a great job with YMCA Katherine coordinating and delivering swimming and water safety lessons to Katherine children. The 2015 NT Most Outstanding Contribution to AUSTSWIM Award recipient is Annette (Floss) Roberts. Floss is passionate about NT children having access to AUSTSWIM qualified teachers, especially in Primary School.



AUSTSWIM Regional and Remote Project

AUSTSWIM and Royal Life Saving NT partner to provide increased AUSTSWIM services to regional and remote areas of the Northern Territory. This project aims to ensure that courses will be run in remote locations for small numbers and that a customised learning plan will be implemented to assist aboriginal people become AUTSWIM qualified teachers of swimming and water safety. In 2014/2015 the number of rural and remote courses represented 45% of all AUSTSWIM courses conducted in the NT. The support of this funding has assisted in the success of the mentoring program and has reduced the number of courses being cancelled.



AUSTSWIM Developing the North

The AUSTSWIM Developing the North funding aims to provide the opportunity for members of remote communities to be mentored through to the AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety courses. In December 2014 we visited the community of Wurrumiyanga on the Tiwi Islands. 7 local Tiwi people from the Sport and Recreation Team and from the Families as First Teachers program commenced their AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming and Water Safety Course.

With the assistance from the local Murrupurtiyanuwu Catholic School (MCS) we were able to combine both theory and practical components. The enthusiasm and use of the local Tiwi language used by course participants was a highlight. We were able to follow up on our mentoring when we returned to Wurrumiyanga in March 2015.





Alice Springs and Central Australia

The 2014/2015 has been an exciting and productive year for the Central Australian office of the Royal Life Saving Society (Australia) NT Branch. Our office location has relocated from the Leichhardt Building to the Charles Darwin University, Alice Springs Campus. From this location RLSSA-NT has been able to service urban and remote locations within central Australia and across the Northern Territory, whilst also providing training courses and delivering the Water Safety Awareness and Swim & Survive program from the Alice Springs Aquatic Centre.

A total of 71 courses with 319 participants were delivered in the Central Desert Region during 2014-2015. The Central Australian Representative delivered 64 courses in total across the NT this included 53 courses of the Central Desert Region courses.

The Sport of Pool Lifesaving has continued to develop with three girls from Alice Springs representing the Northern Territory team at the Pool Lifesaving Nationals held in Hobart in January 2015. The Win of 2 gold and 1 silver in CPR and Line Throw events was a dream come true for each of these girls, and identifies how the Royal Life Saving Society NT is growing the sport within Central Australia. Pool Life Saving membership has increased from 24 to 40 participants and the introduction of an Adult Learn to Swim and Stroke Development Program in conjunction with Pool Lifesaving has proven to be very popular with an increase in membership of 11 adults actively participating on Monday evenings at the Alice Springs Aquatic Centre.

Swim and Survive

With access to a wide variety of aquatic activities it is important that Northern Territory children have access to a nationally recognized swimming and water safety program. The Royal Life Saving Swim and Survive program aims for children to learn or build on a variety of aquatic skills including swimming, water safety, rescue and lifesaving skills in a safe and fun environment. The program has three Award levels for all age groups: Wonder Award (6 months -3 years), Courage Award (3 -5 years) and Active Award (5 -14 years).

For Northern Territory families the Swim and Survive program can be accessed through school coordinated programs, Swim and Survive Partners or Royal Life Saving NT community programs.

It is encouraging to see the continued growth of the Swim and Survive program throughout the Territory. This year saw 14,135 children from urban, regional and remote areas participate in the program. This is a significant achievement and represents an increase of 1950 children (16%) from last year.

Our school communities continue to play an active role in NT children having access to the Swim and Survive Program. This year 100 schools are to be congratulated for embracing the importance of swimming and water safety lessons for their students, an increase of 7 schools (7.5%) from last year. 79 Government schools accounted for 8911 or 64% of all participating students.

Schools in remote areas had access to the Swim and Survive program through the Indigenous Sport and Active Recreation Program (ISARP). This program, funded by the Federal Government, allowed 2831 students from 37 schools in 26 locations to take part.

As promising as these figures are, there is great concern in the declining numbers of students achieving the Swim and Survive, Active Award Level 4 or above. The National Water Safety Education Competency



Framework has a target of 100% of Primary School children achieving Swim and Survive Level 4 or equivalent by the end of their Primary School years. Unfortunately in the NT we are seeing a decline in the number of children achieving this benchmark. This year only 855 (6%) of participating students achieved Swim and Survive Level 4 or above.

VACSWIM and Sunday Lifesaving – Community Programs

Each year in Darwin we conduct a number of Swim and Survive programs for the community to engage in. Our VACSWIM program is conducted during school holidays in January and October at Casuarina Swimming Pool. This year we had 95 children use this opportunity to participate in the intensive VACSWIM Swim and Survive programs. The Sunday Life Saving Program is conducted twice a year over 6 weeks at the Nightcliff Aquatic Centre. This was a true family experience with 228 children from 6 months – 14 years participating in the Swim and Survive Program. The strong relationship that has been forged between Royal Life Saving – NT and its many stakeholders has assisted in the success of the Swim and Survive Program. From councils, pool staff, school communities, parents and participants themselves they have all played a part in growth of the Swim and Survive program. We thank them for their continued commitment to water safety in the Northern Territory. One of our greatest assets at Royal Life Saving – NT is our staff. Our dedicated AUSTSWIM qualified teachers deliver a fun and professional programs and are supported by a committed team.

Together they share the vision of building a healthy, strong and safe aquatic community.

Department of Education Certificate Funding

8911 Government school students received certificate funding through the Northern Territory, Department of Education. This figure includes 2614 Remote Government school students of which 2346 participated in the Indigenous Sport and Active Recreation Program (ISARP).

79 Government schools provided vital swimming and lifesaving skills for their students with 354 students achieving a Level 4 or above.

Royal Life Saving NT acknowledges the Department of Education as the key partner in water safety education and aquatic skill development for school students. Thank you for the ongoing commitment to drowning prevention through student's access to the Swim and Survive program.

Swim and Survive Partner Programs

The Northern Territory is unique in that the delivery of the Swim and Survive Program comes in a variety of forms. Royal Life Saving NT are supported by

the 28 Swim and Survive Partners and schools that are recognised as a preferred deliverer of the Swim and Survive Program. Some of these include Marianne's Swim School, Goldfishbowl Swim School in Palmerston, Alice Springs Aquatic and Leisure Centre and YMCA of Katherine. Government and independent schools in Darwin, Alice Springs and Katherine also deliver the program to their students as a part of their school program.

This year saw 5153 children participate in the Swim and Survive program through the 29 Swim and Survive Partners. This represents 36% of all participants and is an increase of 1607 children (45%) on the 2013 – 2014 figures of 3546.





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Swim and Survive Fund

The Swim and Survive Fund provides swimming and water safety courses for children experiencing social or economic disadvantage. These are often children who have had limited or no exposure to the water and vital water safety education.

Since 2009, Royal Life Saving Society Northern Territory have been assisting the Karama Primary School with the delivery of the Swim and Survive Program. Each year the significant cost of transport is a huge challenge for a low socio-economic school.

In 2014, it looked like the Swim and Survive Program was not going to go ahead. The school had been unsuccessful in finding assistance and they cancelled their booking. RLSSA-NT had the opportunity to apply for a Swim and Survive Fund Grant, the success of this grant provided enough assistance for the program to go ahead. The program was delivered in early September with 148 students participating at Casuarina Pool. The students ranged in age from 5 to 11 years. Students showed confidence, improvement and a willingness to learn throughout the program. A new respect for the aquatic environment was another measure of the success of the program.

Some of the feedback include: "That children that don't normally swim get the opportunity" and "The great improvement we saw in the students swimming ability". The success of the program would not have been achieved without the support and assistance from Royal Life Saving - Swim and Survive Fund, the instructors from Royal Life Saving NT and the Karama Primary School community.





The Royal Life Saving NT Swim and Survive Teacher of the year Award is Michelle Ryan. This award recognises excellence in teaching swimming and water safety, mentoring and coaching new teachers and commitment to drowning prevention. Thank you Michelle for your fantastic work in and out of the water.



Sport Pool Lifesaving



The Australian Pool Lifesaving Championships (APLSC) 2015 was held at the Hobart Aquatics Centre from Friday 16th- Sunday 18th January 2015. There were 150 competitors in total for this year's National competition, with representatives from each state within Australia, as well as one representative from New Zealand and one International representative from the Netherlands.

Athletes from Darwin and Alice Springs represented the Northern Territory this year. The Darwin team under the direction of Alister Lear consisted of Mark Fitzsimons, Umima Shah-Munro and Lysa Hoang; with all three of these competitors having represented the NT team in past National competitions. Our new Alice Springs team under the direction of Petina Franklin and Jill Dowd was Abbey Brown, Georgia Rudd and Erica Portelli; Erica being our youngest competitor at the age of 12. To represent RLSSA NT branch in officiating were Floss Roberts, Jill Dowd and the new Sports & Community Development Officer, Suzie Butler.

Overall the Team did an outstanding job finishing 7th in the competition and we are extremely proud of all individual results. Out of our six athletes, four of them come home with medals.

Abbey Brown netted the NT's first Gold Medal in the CPR category, participating in the Under 16 event with a score of 87 points. Abbey competed in eight events over the course of the competition and applied to be a part of the National Junior Barras Team. Abbey finished 8th overall in the Under16 category.

The NT team took home both the Gold and Silver Medals in the Under 14 Line Throw event; Georgia Rudd GOLD with a time of 15.62 seconds and Erica Portelli SILVER with a time of 16.02 seconds. Both girls competed in the Under 14 and Under 16 speed and CPR events, achieving excellent times with Erica finishing 8th overall in the Under14 events and the team finishing 5th overall for the Under16 and Under19 age category.

Mark Fitzsimons competing in the Master 45-59 age categories won a Gold medal in the 100metre Obstacles, Silver medals in the 100m & 50m Manikin Tow and Manikin Carry and one Bronze in the Line Throw event. Mark also recorded new Personal Best (PB) times in two events.

Lysa Hoang (Masters over 30) and Umima Shah-Munro (Under 19) also did an excellent job in representing the NT team and both achieved PB's in some of their speed events. An excellent effort all round from the 2015 NT Team.

Participation

Our year-long Alice Springs Pool lifesaving program is still going strong with numbers increasing thanks to the use of the indoor heated pool at the Alice Springs Aquatic Centre. The Alice Springs members have been very fortunate to receive first-rate coaching tips from Peter Tonkin of Swimming Australia on a regular basis and also Ryan Chapman, from the QLD Pool Lifesaving team held a coaching clinic for both Pool Lifesaving and Swimming Club members.





Numbers have been consistent in Darwin over term 4 2014 & term 1 2015, with membership numbers consistent for the entire season. Our three Pool Lifesaving coaches joined forces with a couple of our swimmers to compete in this years Leah Cullen 5km race hosted by Swimming NT on the 28th March, with a 3rd place finish.

A huge Thank you to those who have volunteered their time to help train our weekly sessions both in Darwin and Alice Springs, your contribution to the sport and our community is immensely appreciated. We are looking forward to seeing everyone back on pool deck for the 2015/2106 season.

Pool Lifesaving Regional and Remote

Pool Lifesaving Carnivals were held in Katherine, Tennant Creek, Wadeye, Maningrida, Pirlangimpi, Wurrumiyanga, Borroloola, Ngukurr, Yuendumu, Kintore, Alyangula and Batchelor ensuring that Pool Lifesaving is active in the regional and remote areas of the Northern Territory. An Active Family Fun Day and Come and Try Pool Lifesaving event was held in Nhulunbuy (25/8/2014), Alice Springs (22/9/2014), Darwin (24/9/2014) and Tennant Creek (22/10/2014).



Education and Programs

Our goal is to increase participation and awareness in water safety education, training and sport in urban, regional and remote communities—Delivered through the Swim and Survive program, People with Disabilities, Adults and the Partnership Program.

Not every Territorian has the same needs; so within our programs, we look to offer specific courses that are designed to meet the needs of Territorians of all ages and abilities.

Infant Aquatics

Nurturing a love of the water in a safe environment for the youngest members of our Community is at the centre of the Infant Aquatic Program. Two six week programs were held in 2014/2015, one at Casuarina Pool and the other at Nightcliff Aquatic Centre. Both programs were very popular with mums, dads, grandparents, carers and of course the infants themselves. 115 children participated in the two Programs. A special acknowledgement must be paid to the wonderful AUSTSWIM Infant qualified Instructors who make these Programs such an enjoyable experience for all involved. This year our Instructors were Joan Burns, Stephanie Cockfield, Maxine Cross, Penny McKay, Eleanor Scott and Jenny Verrall, Anna Wilson, Rana Everett.

In partnership with Preschools we also offer water familiarisation through the Wonder segment of the Swim and Survive Program and more advanced skills for older children in the Courage segment. 64 Wonder certificates and 46 Courage certificates were awarded this year.

Programs for People with Disabilities: Access and Inclusion

The relationship between Royal Life Saving – NT and Total Recreation continues to grow and strengthen. In 2014 – 2015, Royal Life Saving NT delivered two swimming and water safety programs for the Total Recreation (Sport in Schools) program at Palmerston Aquatic and Lifestyle Centre. This program aims to give students with a disability, in mainstream school, the opportunity to participate in a water safety and swimming program that is tailor made for their needs. This year the modified Swim and Survive program saw on average 50 students each week take part in the program.

Schools who were involved in this year's program included: Woodroffe Primary School, Humpty Doo Primary School and Taminmin College. The culmination of the program saw a swimming carnival held with modified events that allowed participation from ALL students. Chelsea Day Recreation Officer from Total Recreation said: "Total Recreation run a swimming program catered to children with disabilities throughout term 1 and 4 Royal Life Saving NT plays a vital role in this programs success. The staff are fantastic and have all the skills needed to adjust their program to suit students with disabilities. Their patience and understanding of the students special needs means the classes are run efficiently and are always a lot of fun."



Adults





Royal Life Saving NT are always looking at ways to engage with the community. The City of Darwin – Healthy Darwin program gave us the opportunity to conduct swimming and water safety lessons to Darwin residents. "Healthy Darwin is all about getting the people of Darwin active and living a healthy lifestyle" and this was highlighted with a number of people taking part in Adult Learn to Swim lessons at Casuarina Pool. Thanks to

the City of Darwin for allowing us to assist with this great program.

Our Pool Lifesaving Club gives adults the opportunity to improve on their swimming skills, water safety skills and learn pool lifesaving in a fun and relaxed environment.

A big thank you to our dedicated volunteers who are a valuable part of the successful running of our Pool Lifesaving sessions at Casuarina Pool on Wednesday nights. The program is held in conjunction with our younger athletes program allowing the sessions to become a family orientated evening.

Cool Seniors & Grey Medallion

In 2014, one third (33%) of all drowning deaths in Australia were people aged 55 years and over. This equates to 87 Senior Australians with one of these being in the Northern Territory. While this is a reduction of 22 people on last year we need to remain vigilant and proactive in this area.

With the assistance of a grant from the Northern Territory Government we were able to conduct two aquatic based programs at the NT Swim School. Our Cool Seniors aquatic programs aims to build confidence in the water environment through exercise, water familiarisation and swimming. This year we had 59 participants

over the 4 weeks,



The Grey Medallion is a water safety and lifesaving skills program for the over 55's. The four main components of the program are Water Safety Knowledge, Resuscitation and Emergency Care, Aquatic Exercise and Personal Survival and Lifesaving Skills. In 2014 we had 8 Senior Territorians complete the Grey Medallion program.






Our Water

Drowning Report

The Northern Territory Drowning Report was released on the 30th September 2014. Sadly the NT maintains the highest drowning rate per capita in Australia with 13 drowning deaths recorded in this period



NORTHERN TERRITORY **DROWNING SUMMARY 2014**

There were 13 people who drowned in Northern Territory waterways between 1 July 2013 and 30 June 2014. This is an increase of 6 deaths (43%) on the 10 year (2003/04 to 2012/13) average of 8 deaths (Figure NT1). Of the people who drowned in the Northern Territory in 2013/14, 69% were male.

The Northern Territory continues to have the highest drowning rate per capita in Australia, with a rate of 5.36 drowning deaths per 100,000 people in 2013/14.

100% of the drowning deaths occurred in Outer Regional, Remote and Very Remote locations. The River / Creek / Stream category was the location with the highest number of drowning deaths (39%), followed by Swimming Pools (23%) (Figure NT2).

Swimming and Recreating was the most common activity being undertaken immediately prior to drowning in the Northern Territory, accounting for 46% of all drowning deaths in the Territory in 2013-14 (Figure NT3).

100% of all drowning deaths in the Northern Territory in 2013/14 occurred in the Wet Season.

CASE STUDY: CROCODILE SAFETY

Between 1 July 2003 and 30 June 2013, there have been 9 deaths due to crocodiles in waterways across the Northern Territory. It should be assumed that any body of water in the Northern Territory may contain large and potentially dangerous crocodiles. While crocodiles are more active during the warmer months (Wet season), it should never be assumed that it is safe to enter the water at any time of the year.

Royal Life Saving NT reminds people to Be Crocwise and follow some simple safety tips:

- Never swim in water where crocodiles may live, even if there is no warning sign. Only swim in designated safe swimming areas.
- Obey all crocodile warning signs they are there for your safety and protection.
- Never provoke, harass or interfere with crocodiles, even small ones.
- Never feed crocodiles, it is illegal and dangerous.
- Be extra vigilant around water at night and during the breeding season from September to April.
- Avoid approaching the edge of the water and don't paddle or wade at the edge of the water.
- Always stand a minimum of five metres from the water's edge when fishing.




Figure NT1: Unintentional Drowning Deaths and Crude Death Rates, Northern Territory, 2002/03-2013/14, 10 Year Average




Figure NT2: Location of Drowning Deaths, Northern Territory, 2013/14




Figure NT3: Activity Prior to Drowning, Northern Territory, 2013/14

Water Safety Awareness Program:

What is the Water Safety Awareness Program?

- The Water Safety Awareness Program consists of five free water safety classes for the parents and guardians of children aged less than five years old who reside in the Northern Territory.
- The Program is funded through the NT Government's Sport and Recreation Department and is implemented by the not-for-profit organisation the Royal Life Saving Society (Australia) NT Branch Inc.
- The first session is designed to give families a basic awareness of the specific risk factors in and around water for children and some basic instruction in resuscitation skills.
- Families must attend the first session before they can access the rest of the Program.
- The four in-water classes are then delivered by AUSTSWIM accredited Teachers of Infants and Preschool Aquatics to ensure the highest quality and standard of instruction.
- Vouchers for the in-water classes can be used at accredited swim schools to make it as easy as possible for families to complete the course.
- As many parents cannot afford to continue to pay for lessons after the four free water-based lessons, our task is to provide sets of progressive skills that parents can continue on their own.
- One of the most important elements of the Water Safety Awareness Program is the way parents and carers are directly involved in the Program. They must attend every session together with their child(ren) so the benefits of the Program can continue at home.
- Each year, over 1100 children enrol in the Program.
- It is the only comprehensive, free water safety program for children under five in Australia. The Program is not just industry best practice; it is community safety best practice. The results speak for themselves; the Northern Territory has gone from the highest to the lowest per capita drowning rate for children under five in Australia.


Why was the Water Safety Awareness Program started?

- The Water Safety Awareness Program was introduced in the Northern Territory at a time when it had a drowning rate of three times the national average.
- In the nine years prior to the Program's commencement 35 children aged less than five drowned in the Northern Territory.
- Children were drowning in backyard swimming pools, wading pools, lakes, storm water drains and other natural bodies of water. Tragically, one child even drowned in the rainwater left at the bottom of a dinghy.

What has the Water Safety Awareness Program Achieved?

- The Water Safety Awareness Program has been highly successful at achieving its core goal of reducing the number of children under five who have drowned in the Northern Territory.
- Up until 30 June 2015, 14,990 children have enrolled in the Program; and of those children, 78% have completed all five sessions of the Program.
- The Program is very popular with Northern Territory families. As part of the continuous improvement evaluations, the feedback from families for this Government initiative has been consistently positive, with the Program seen to be a practical and appropriate solution to a real concern for families.

Water Safety Awareness Program: Total <u>14,990</u> enrolled A partnership between the NT Government and Royal Life Saving Society (Australia) NT Branch





The Year that was for The Water Safety Awareness Program:

Total of 3024 Enrolments for July 2014 – June 2015 with 78% voucher usage since beginning of Program.

This year has seen a dramatic increase in registrations to the Water Safety Awareness Program largely due to the introduction of the NT Government Learn to Swim Voucher. This voucher was introduced on 1st July 2014 and entitles all NT children under the age of 5 who have completed the Water Safety Awareness Program to two \$100 vouchers, twice a year to be used for swimming lessons. This generous program has enabled many more Territory families to access swimming lessons whereas previously they may not have been able to afford them.

Remote Access:

The Water Safety Program is accessible to all Northern Territorians and every registration receives up to date information on "what to do in an emergency" and helpful information on "keeping watch" around the water.



The program delivers high quality water sessions which are delivered by AUSTSWIM Teachers of Infant and Preschool Aquatics.

This year the Program was delivered in Angurugu, Borroloola, Douglas Daly, Elliott, Santa Teresa, Yuendumu, Maningrida and Ngukurr.

Water Safety Week 2014

Water Safety Week 2014 was conducted from 21-28 September, featuring a varied program of events and activities throughout the Northern Territory (NT). The slogan for Water Safety Week 2014 was *Water Safety is 24/7*. This year the focus was on water safety whilst recreating. The event was promoted through print, radio, television and social media. In addition to this promotion was also

'Splashfest' was the opening event for Water Safety Week 2014 and took place from 10:00am – 2:00pm on Sunday 21 September at the Darwin Waterfront Precinct. Approximately 1500 people attended. This figure was obtained from traffic counters recently installed at the Darwin Waterfront Precinct. The assistance of the Darwin Waterfront Corporation in helping to organise and advertise this event was greatly appreciated. The Water Safety Creek activity proved very popular with 127 children entering the competition with Riley Seden-Kurnoth winning a family voucher to Curve Restaurant and a family Wave Lagoon pass. 10 stakeholders' hosted stalls and two activities were hosted by Royal Life Saving NT. There were 20 events and activities on the official 2014 Water Safety week calendar. These were conducted in Alice Springs, Darwin, Palmerston and Elliott. Some of the highlights of the free events were:

- Flare demonstration

An estimated 10,000 Territorians received water safety messages throughout Water Safety Week in 2014. In addition to these events Hot 100 also promoted Water Safety Week every morning with Boof the Barra teaming up with Black Betty and giving out water safety prize packs to their listeners.



The Water Safety Week colouring in competition was also popular with 225 entries being received.

The Under 5 category winner was Kiara Ikonomou from Moil and the Over 5 winner was Jack Flanagan from Palmerston.

Pipes and Drains Campaign 2014-2015

The Pipes and Drains campaign was launched on 2nd December 2014 by Minister Matt Conlan. The campaign received a complete makeover from the Northern Territory Government resulting in a television ad being produced with a strong message. All schools in the Darwin and Palmerston region were contacted regarding the campaign and free Pipes and Drains talks to their students were offered. Despite being close to the school holidays and the end of the school year, nine schools participated in the talks across two weeks. 1720 students attended these talks. Pipes and Drains talks continued on in the new school year and Ludmilla Primary School, Alawa Primary School and Wagaman Primary all displayed the Pipes and Drains on their school fences to help promote the campaign. Twelve Pipes and Drains Banners were delivered to the City of Palmerston and these were displayed throughout the community.





Keep Watch

Keep Watch is a public education program of Royal Life Saving Society - Australia, aimed at preventing drowning deaths of children under 5 years of age in all aquatic locations. There are 4 main actions of the Keep Watch program that parents and carers of children are encouraged to undertake to prevent children drowning.

The Keep Watch program has 4 key actions to prevent your child from drowning. These actions are not to be used in isolation and should form part of a web of prevention measures. Therefore if one line of defence fails there are more prevention measures working together to prevent your child from drowning. These actions are:

- Supervise
- Restrict Access
- Water Awareness
- Resuscitate

Keep Watch Ambassadors agree to act as a community contact point and distribution centre for information on preventing toddler drowning. Thank you to our NT Ambassadors for their commitment to drowning prevention strategies for parents and carers of young children.

Royal Life Saving is targeting risk areas for toddler drowning deaths such as public pools. Lack of direct supervision by the parent or carer while the child was in the water has been the main factor in 70% of all drowning deaths at public pools.

The Keep Watch @ Public Pools program aims to eliminate all drowning deaths and reduce the number of near drowning incidents that occur in aquatic leisure centres, public swimming centres and pools.

The program is targeted at parents and carers of children to help them understand the dangers of leaving their children unattended at the pool. As a parent you have a responsibility to look after your own children. Lifeguards do a great job at keeping our pools safe but they are not babysitters.

Indigenous Sport and Recreation Program – "Remote Swim and Survive"

Royal Life Saving Society Northern Territory has continued with its third year of its tri-annual funding. On behalf of Royal Life Saving Society Northern Territory and the communities who benefit, we thank the Department of Regional Australia, Local Government, Arts and Sport and the Department Prime Minister and Cabinet for the opportunity to participate in the Indigenous Sport & Active Recreation Program (ISARP).

The ISARP project delivers on the Swim & Survive program, AUSTSWIM Mentoring program and training. It extends to 38 remote Indigenous communities within the Northern Territory utilising 21 locations.

ISARP allows students who live in remote locations, who do not have access to qualified swimming instructors, the opportunity to learn about being safe in, on and around the aquatic environment. This also incorporates dry, in class, sessions for schools and their students who, this year, are unable to access a safe water environment. The project also includes the identification of local indigenous people to participate in the indigenous AUSTSWIM mentoring program. This training project allows local members of the community to become AUSTSWIM qualified swimming instructors who can potentially provide quality, ongoing swimming lessons to their community.

A team consisting of two Royal Life Saving Society Northern Territory staff visit the communities for an intensive five day stay. These visits are conducted during the school terms and in many situations

the whole school will be taught each day, this may include up to 150 students. Teaching the children every day, for five days allows skills to be reinforced and built upon.

In many communities a barbeque is hosted at the pool during one afternoon. During this time we conduct a Pool Lifesaving Carnival to introduce the sport to community members. The sport and BBQ is provided for the whole community and aims to promote the pool as the social hub. Promoting the pool as a place families can access and feel like they are in a fun and safe environment.


Key facts at a glance

3642 people participate in the Indigenous Sport and Active Recreation Project

- 35 remote schools accessed the program.
- Teams visited 26 remote communities.
- 2831 students participated in Swim and Survive.
- 3 students achieved a Bronze Star award through Swim and Survive the highest award given this year.
- 158 students achieved the national swimming and water safety benchmark of a level four and above.
- The AUSTSWIM mentoring program saw 5 indigenous people who have ongoing participation in teaching the Remote Swim & Survive Program.
- 11 indigenous people are continuing to work through their Indigenous AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming & Water Safety Award.
- 222 people were trained and are now qualified in a range of qualifications such as Bronze Medallion, CPR, Pool Lifeguard, Indigenous AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming & Water Safety Award and First Aid through the project.

Remote Swim & Survive

2831 students participated in the ISARP Swim & Survive program across the Northern Territory, decreasing by 107 students from the previous year. 3 students, 1 from Areyonga and 2 from Mutitjulu achieved a Bronze Star award through the ISARP Swim & Survive Program, the highest level awarded in 2014-2015. 158 students achieved the National Water Safety Council bench mark of a level 4 or above in the ISARP Swim and Survive program during this financial year. This figure is below last year's figure of 309 students. This decrease can be attributed to the projects ability to access older, more senior students in key communities such as Maningrida, Jabiru and Wadeye. The students who participated last year were unable to attend the program for various reasons. Although there has been a decrease in the National Water Safety Council bench mark of a level 4 and above, there has been an overall increase in the swimming abilities of children who are approaching these abilities in the future. As seen below the numbers of students reaching both a level D3 and 3 have doubled on last year's figures. Therefore in the upcoming years, as these students increase their abilities through the remote Swim & Survive Program an increase in the National Water Safety Council bench mark of a level 4 and above will also increase in remote areas.



Training and the AUSTSWIM Mentoring Program

Royal Life Saving Society Northern Territory aims to develop skills and empower local people within indigenous communities, allowing them to develop and maintain their swimming pool and the ongoing development of the Swim and Survive Program so it is not a once-a-year activity. This year 153 indigenous people completed a range of training through the project including 21 Bronze Medallions, 10 Pool Lifeguards and 21 First Aids.

In conjunction with the Swim and Survive Program, the team also aims to deliver the AUSTSWIM Mentoring Program. Prior

and throughout visits the team works with relevant members of the community to identify potential instructors and candidates who may be able to participate in the AUSTSWIM Mentoring Program and value add to their community. A total of 11 indigenous people began the program this year including 4 indigenous people from Borroloola who aim to gain employment at the pool.

This year's highlights

Throughout the project our relationships with the local Family as First Teachers (FaFT) groups within our communities has continued to grow. The project has allowed Royal Life Saving - Northern Territory to provide the Water Safety Awareness Program (WSAP) to these remote families who have children under 5 years of age. Coordination and delivery of the WSAP program has been identified as a high priority by both the local school and in turn the local FaFT groups. In the previous year a total of 8 families accessed the initiative, this year a total of 105 families took part in the program. Recognition needs to go to the coordinators of these groups who have continued over the past 3 years, to promote our project to the wider community. Especially communities such as Hermannsburg, Ngukurr & Maningrida who had over 15 families participate throughout our week visit. These communities have played an active role in promoting families and their children learn about aquatic awareness, capabilities and an understanding of supervision requirements for children around the water.

Inland Waterways and Drowning Prevention Program

In 2014 the Abbott Government committed a \$4 million investment to the Royal Life Saving Society Australia to actively target black spots for river drownings in our community. Over the next four years Royal Life Saving Australia will be working across the country to implement drowning prevention interventions, targeting identified river drowning black spots and educating the community on risk reduction.

In the Northern Territory, the Katherine River was ranked number 9 on the black spot list in the National report published by RLSSA 'Drowning Deaths in Australian Rivers, Creeks and Stream: a 10 year analysis'. This resulted in the Katherine River being a primary focus for the first stages of our NT River Safety project.

Royal Life Saving NT has since then been working to establish key objectives for our NT River Safety project, the initial six-week consultation & survey period within the Katherine Community has been completed.

Key Objectives for River Safety Project

- Reduce drowning deaths in rivers and inland waterways
- Develop a river safety community education initiative
- Initiate a community safety plan for the Katherine River to address the black spot
- Implement strategies to improve the culture of water safety in the NT and promote safer aquatic behaviors
- Develop and align water safety messages to key risk including the seasonal challenges of wet season with an emphasis on Keep Watch
- Increase community awareness and participation in water safety skills and events for disadvantaged and at risk populations
- Reduce drowning deaths in children

The six-week consultation period begun on the 10th April 2015 with Executive Director, Floss Roberts & Project Officer, Suzie Butler meeting with key stakeholder groups in the Katherine Community and initiating survey responses. The generated survey for the project was designed to find out what the community already knew about the drownings that had occurred in the Katherine River, did they think there was a concern for river safety, who they thought was at risk and how they, as a community could help prevent future drownings. The survey was also used to generate a community driven River safety slogan. We wanted the slogan to come from the community so it would be more effective and be specific to the black spot target areas in the NT.

The survey was effectively distributed through the community, with our projects team situated outside of Woolworths in the local Katherine Shopping Centre on ten separate occasions, the projects team also attended 3 Saturday Katherine community markets, conducted workshops with the Year 7 Clontarf Academy students and joined the YMCA in one of their Drop-In nights to chat about River Safety and also visited the two Parks and Wildlife Junior Rangers groups down at the Katherine Gorge.

717 people responded to the survey, we were able to analyze the data from the community. What we found from the community was that only 15.61% of those that completed the survey knew that the Katherine River was ranked number 9 on the Black Spot list, 65.64% of respondents were not aware that the NT has the highest drowning rate per capita in Australia, however 87.71% did think that water safety was an issue for Territorians.

Education, Swimming and Awareness were the key words used in how the community could help stop future drownings in the Katherine River. With this in mind we have been able to move into the development and implementation phase of the action plan for the project. The community generated slogan for the project has been decided: BE RiverSafe.

The BE RiverSafe slogan has 5 key messages to accompany it so it reaches all demographics in the community:

- 1. Look, Think, Decide
- 2. Educate, Watch ya mate
- 3. River Safe is River Sober
- 4. Our Rivers, Your Family. Keep watch
- 5. If it's flooded, forget it

The BE RiverSafe campaign will launch officially in September 2015, in time for the wet season.



1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation

This financial report is a special purpose set of financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Act (NT) 2003. The committee has determined that the not-for-profit Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(b) Property, plant and equipment

The committee have adopted a capitalisation threshhold of \$5,000. All capital items acquired below this value will be immediately expensed in the income statement. This policy was initially adopted to ensure consistency with the capitalisation policy of the Northern Territory Government (NTG), being the major funding body of the Association. It is acknowledged that the NTG threshhold has subsequently been increased to \$10,000, however the committee are of the opinion that this limit is not considered appropriate at this stage.

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

(c) Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

(d) Financial assets

Investments held are originally recognised at cost, which includes transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at fair value which is equivalent to their market bid price at the end of the reporting period. Movements in fair value are recognised through an equity reserve.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 30 June 2015

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(f) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting year. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(g) Income tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(h) Leases

Leases of fixed assets where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership that are transferred to the Association are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives where it is likely that the Association will obtain ownership of the asset or over the term of the lease.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all of the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

Lease incentives under operating leases are recognised as a liability and amortised on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

(i) Revenue and other income

The Association recognises revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured, it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the entity and specific criteria have been met for each of Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc.'s activities as discussed below.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. Any consideration deferred is treated as the provision of finance and is discounted at a rate of interest that is generally accepted in the market for similar arrangements. The difference between the amount initially recognised and the amount ultimately received is interest revenue.

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point of delivery as this corresponds to the transfer of significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods and the cessation of all involvement in those goods.

Interest revenue

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 30 June 2015

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(j) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

(k) Going concern

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis. This basis has been adopted on the assumption that the Association will continue to receive sufficient financial support from government agencies to allow the Association to meet its liabilities. Should this support cease this basis of preparation may no longer be appropriate.

13 Contingent Liabilities

Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. had the following contingent liability at the end of the reporting period:

Water Safety Awareness Program

The Association receives funding to provide the 'Water Safety Awareness Program (WSAP)'. The WSAP provides registered children, under the age of five years, with vouchers for the free attendance at five WSAP sessions. On the attainment of age five these vouchers expire. Each funded voucher has a face value of \$12.50.

The Association physically receives the funding for the entire year's program at the commencement of each financial year. At the conclusion of each financial year the Association reconciles the unpresented, unexpired vouchers. At 30 June 2015 the number of unpresented, unexpired vouchers were 11,252 (2014: 11,252). The funded face value these vouchers is \$205,125.

On review of the total vouchers presented during the year, it was established that 8,395 (2014: 4,442) vouchers were utilised during the current year. Included in this balance were 238 (2014: 1,187) vouchers which were written back as expired, being 3% (2014: 27%) of the total number of vouchers utilised.

Historically, there has been significant probability that a material number of these outstanding vouchers would expire without being utilised. As such, the recognition of this liability in the Statement of Financial Position has not been considered appropriate. This assessment will be reconsidered in the next 12 months as untilisation of the vouchers has improved significantly during the current financial year, resulting in a substantial decrease in the number of unutilised expired vouchers.

Report on the Financial Report

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial report gives a true and fair view of the financial position of Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. as at 30 June 2015, and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Act (2003) of the Northern Territory and the association's constitution.

Basis of Accounting & Going concern

Without modifying our opinion, we draw attention to the following:

Note 1 to the financial report describes the basis of accounting adopted by the association. The financial report is prepared to assist Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. to comply with the financial reporting provisions of the Associations Act (2003) of the Northern Territory and the association's constitution. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.

Note 1 to the financial statement provides that the association receives a significant amount of its income from various government agencies. The appropriateness of preparing the association's financial statements on a going concern basis is dependent upon this continued government support.
