In the last twelve months, Royal Life Saving (Australia) Northern Territory Branch has seen more than 2000 children enrolled in the Water Safety Awareness Program. Over 28,000 children have participated in the Program since inception, which has no doubt contributed to the prevention of drowning instances in children under five years of age.

As joint Patrons, we were delighted to host and award the inaugural Administrators Medal Award this year. This Award acknowledges an individual for their exceptional contribution to Lifesaving, Water Safety and Drowning Prevention in the Northern Territory. Throughout the 2020/2021 year an amazing 27,298 certificates, including 14,227 from the Swim and Survive program and 13,071 training certificates, were issued.

We have a very focussed strategic plan, "Our People, Our Lifestyle, Our Water 2018-2022", that outlines our purpose over the next four years. Report from the Executive Director



In 2020/21 we celebrated 3653 active members, representing an incredible 50% increase from the previous year. We conducted 94 community events reaching 25,860 people. Royal Life Saving NT provided a community benefit and services to 45,337 people across the Northern Territory, this is equal to reaching 20% of our population.

Our focus is drowning prevention strategies relevant to the needs of our community. Despite our committed actions and advocacy, the Northern Territory maintains the highest drowning rate, per capita, in Australia.

14,227 primary school aged children from 79 schools participated in the Swim and Survive program, with 1109 achieving the national benchmark of level 4. Participation numbers have increased and the number achieving a level 4 has also increased slightly, with 4.5% of enrolled students achieving the National Benchmark. Royal Life Saving NT is pleased to record an increase however we continue to engage families, schools and lobby Government to fund the Swim and Survive Program for Primary School students. The collaboration with the Department of Education has created an exciting option for Swimming and Water Safety for children in upper-primary school. The Water Safety and Life Skills program for students in Years 4, 5 and 6 is 3 full days of curriculum linked

Water Safety, Life Skills, Tennis, Yoga, Team Building and scenarios over a three-week period. This program provides opportunity for schools to minimise costs and disruption to class, while still teaching vital skills.

1,268 children from 27 remote schools participated in the Remote Swim, Survive and Strive project and 86 students achieved the national swimming and water safety benchmark of a level four and above, 4 students from Tennant Creek achieved a Level 6. The project enabled children to learn to swim and participate in a Pool Lifesaving carnival. The project includes Royal Life Saving training and AUSTSWIM mentoring to assist local people in obtaining employment or volunteer services at their community swimming pool. 341 local community people participated in this training, with 35 indigenous people gaining employment. 43 Indigenous rangers completed training and 61 Indigenous people who are currently employed within their community, received ongoing professional development.

13,071 training certificates were issued with 40% of this training conducted in regional and remote areas. 5,677 statements of attainments were issued under Vocational Education and Training. 475 Training courses were conducted across the Northern Territory for 3,246 participants.

The NT Government funded Water Safety Awareness Program provides a fantastic opportunity for families to access free water safety lessons for their child. This year 2,004 enrolments were received with 15 providers operating across the NT. 28,113 children have participated in this program since inception. The NT Government have extended the program with the Learn to Swim Vouchers and this has been positively received by families across the Northern Territory. The 15 year evaluation of the program highlights the value of the program to Our Community and how it is making a real difference to drowning prevention.

OUR Sport of Pool Lifesaving maintained participation with over 3,000 children participating in carnivals in Darwin, Katherine, Alice Springs, Tennant Creek and remote communities. The Australian Pool Life Saving Championships were cancelled due to Covid-19 lockdowns. This provided an opportunity for increased services in regional locations, including a coaching workshop in Nhulunbuy and a Community Lifesaving Event. Thank you to our coaches, volunteers and officials whose ongoing commitment and contribution to the sport makes a huge difference for our community.

I am pleased to complete my report by advising members, stakeholders and volunteers that the NT Branch is in a strong position and looks forward to ongoing challenges and opportunities. I would like to sincerely thank our devoted volunteers including the Executive Management Team led by Penny Hart, our trainers, swim teachers and our members. A Massive THANK YOU to our fantastic staff for their continued dedication and commitment. I would like to thank Royal Life Saving National Office and all the State and Territory Member Organisations for working collaboratively to save lives and make a positive contribution to our community.

2020/21 Highlights

- 45,337 Provided a community benefit and services to 45,337 people across the Northern Territory; this equates to a reach of 20% of our population.
- 14,227 children participated in the Swim and Survive program with 1109 Students achieving the National Water Safety Competency Benchmark of a level 4 or above.
- 342 children participated in our "Little Royals Swim School" Program run in Batchelor, Katherine and Darwin with 154 of these registered in Katherine
- 2,508 people participated within the Indigenous Advancement Strategy Remote Swim, Survive & Strive. The
 project ran within 20 remote communities with 27 remote schools accessing the program. This includes 1,268
 students in remote locations with 86 achieving the national swimming and water safety benchmark of a level 4 or
 above.
 - 4 students achieved a Level 6, the highest award achieved this year. 341 people were trained and now qualified with a range of qualifications. This year, 35 indigenous people gained employment through the training and mentoring of the Swim, Survive & Strive Project. Along with 61 indigenous people who are currently employed within their community and received ongoing professional development. Ranger training was completed by 43 indigenous sea rangers.
- 475 Training courses were conducted across the NT for 3,246 participants, with 13,071 certificates issued including 5,677 statements of attainments.
- AUSTSWIM: 10 courses and 4 professional development sessions with 122 participants. We continue to administer the AUSTSWIM State Advisory Committee
- The Northern Territory Water Safety Advisory Council was administered on behalf of the Northern Territory Government with 4 meetings conducted, reports completed to the Northern Territory's Water Safety Strategy for 2017-2021.
- 10 Schools participated in Pipes and Drains education sessions which reached 1,975 students. In addition to this,
 5 community events were attended directly targeting the Pipes & Drains message, reaching an estimated 5,000 people
- A total of 32 schools were visited by the Water Safety Unit to deliver water safety talks to 3,446 students across
 the NT.
- Water Safety Week ran from September 20-26 and incorporated 14 events to reach over 10,000 people, including Splashfest.
- 28,113 children have enrolled in the Water Safety Awareness Program since 2003, with 75% of children completing all five sessions.
- There was a total of 2004 enrolments for 2020/21 in the Water Safety Awareness Program with 15 Providers Swim Schools
- Conducted 94 community events, providing a direct community benefit to over 25,860 people
- Maintained 29 Keep Watch Ambassadors and worked with all levels of Government to highlight the importance of water safety and preventing drowning
- 3653 Members, with 401 Voting Members
- Over 3000 children participated in 22 grassroots pool lifesaving carnivals
- Beriversafe and Respect the River campaign conducted 16 community events across the Northern Territory
- Maintained 11 Permanent staff, including 1 full-time position based in Alice Springs; 29 registered Trainers and 30 casual Swim Teachers.
- Sadly 5 people drowned in 2020/21 year in the Northern Territory

Our Community

A crucial element of Royal Life Saving Northern Territory's activities is working with all Territorians to raise awareness and share water safety skills and knowledge, specifically to prevent drowning. As a public benevolent institution (PBI), public education and advocacy are at the core of our purpose.

In the past financial year Royal Life Saving Northern Territory has had an active involvement in 94 community events at schools, shopping centres, parenting groups, remote communities and major Northern Territory events including Water Safety Week, Children's Week and the Defence Expo.

In addition to these events, two new events were attended, National Families Week and the YMCA's Youth Week Pool Party. These events were enjoyed greatly by the volunteers who attended them and gave great exposure to the activities of the organisation. Over 25,860 members of the community directly interacted with Royal Life Saving Northern Territory at these events. This is a substantial decrease in Territorian's engagement with water safety messages compared to last year and is directly related to the global pandemic, which saw the cancellation of the NT Show Circuit, Lifestyle expos and the Darwin Festival events.

RLSSANT implemented a revised community engagement plan which saw an increase in the delivery of RLSSANT hosted community activities. The revised circuit started off in Alice Springs with an Active Family Fun Day at Ellery Creek Big Hole. The circuit continued to Tennant Creek for the River Safety Picnic at Lake Mary Ann which has been named the 'Tennant Creek Regatta' by local people. Katherine played host to two community events at Edith Falls and the Katherine Hot Springs. The last community pop up event was in Darwin at the Waterfront Lagoon. All events introduced a new signature activity of Stand-Up Paddle boards, which was very popular with all participants. In total, 20 community events were coordinated and hosted by RLSSANT in the revised community engagement plan. This demonstrates the commitment and dedication of the staff members and volunteers of Royal Life Saving Northern Territory to drowning prevention in our community.

These innovative events allowed RLSSANT to directly connect with the community. Thank you to all the volunteers who were involved with the revised circuit and helped to make each event a great success.





Our Volunteers

Pool Lifesaving benefitted from volunteer assistance throughout the year with Alister Lear continuing to support Darwin Pool Lifesaving.

In addition to community events, board members also donated their time to provide strategic assistance; their time was dependant on their specific responsibilities. Over 100 hours were donated to the Organisation to ensure the operations plan aligned to the budget and strategic plan.

As a volunteer organisation, Royal Life Saving Northern Territory is very fortunate to be associated with amazing people who are willing to donate their valuable time to spread the water safety message. Since 2010/2011 an individual has been recognised for their outstanding commitment to the community.

In the past year we have continued our development of Vocational Education and Training agendas. Clarifying industry needs, supporting workforce development, whilst keeping a close eye on safety imperatives that are essential components of our role in this area.

During 2020-2021, 475 courses were conducted with 3246 Participants, 13071 certificates issued including 5677 Statements of Attainment, refer **appendix 1: Training Certificates issues**

The Annual Trainers workshop serves to ensure quality training and consistent practices are upheld and to ensure legislative requirements are being met and maintained. To ensure course participants receive professional and concise training, trainers are required to attend the annual trainers' workshop to reaccredit their qualifications and validate assessment tools and procedures. The 16th annual workshop was held on September 4 with 90% of trainers in attendance.

Since 2009, Royal Life Saving NT has recognised one trainer each year for their outstanding commitment to training. The trainer of the year for 2020/2021 is Kate Conway. Kate is a full-time trainer with RLSSANT. In the past 12 months Kate has delivered and assessed 189 training courses with 1033 participants across the whole of the Northern Territory. Kate brings a considered and thoughtful approach to her training and equally a willingness to strive for high quality training outcomes for her participants. Her honest, friendly, and considerate nature are qualities that make her participants feel at ease in the learning environment.

Aquatic Facility Safety Assessments

Risk management is an essential tool for the successful and continued operation of an aquatic or leisure facility. The AFSA is based on the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operation, Australian Standards and relevant State and Territory legislation. Creating recommendations for the best practice for public safety, management and operation in aquatic

In line with the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operation, the areas the AFSA covers are general operations, emergency procedures, record keeping, first aid, plant room operations and chemicals, facility design, supervision, programming and specific aquatic areas such as wave pools and diving towers.

The increased demands on facility managers to improve safety standards and keep abreast of industry best practice can be difficult and time consuming. Often, the skills required to assess and improve safety are not available internally, yet risk management is an essential tool for the successful and continued operation of an aquatic or leisure facility.

To assist facility managers, Royal Life Saving has introduced the Aquatic Facility Safety Assessment (AFSA) to provide best practice recommendations for public safety, management and operation of aquatic facilities. It is recommended that an AFSA is conducted at least annually. During 2020/2021, 11 aguatic facilities across the Northern Territory undertook an Aquatic Facility Safety Assessment.

AUSTSWIM



The AUSTSWIM accreditation is the industry standard for Swimming and Water Safety Teachers™ and is delivered and recognised in each state and territory of Australia and many countries overseas. Royal Life Saving Society NT is a sub agency of AUSTSWIM and works closely with aquatic stakeholders, education departments, peak industry organisations and the community to achieve the AUSTSWIM philosophy; that all Australians should have appropriate and relevant swimming and water safety skills and understand the principles and practices of water safety.

In 2020/2021, RLSSANT conducted a total of 10 courses and 4 Professional Development session with 122 participants across the Northern Territory.

Royal Life Saving NT appreciates the continued support from AUSTSWIM Head Office, AUSTSWIM SA and other Business Centres.

Alice Springs and Central Australia

RLSSANT actively sought to reduce drowning through engaging the community in education, programs, sport and training throughout 2020/21.

- Training: 54 courses were held with a total of 211 participants within Central Australia and included Bronze Medallion and updates, Pool Lifeguard and updates, First Aid, CPR, and Swimming Teacher Rescue Awards. The KPI of 200 participants was achieved, with 211 participants.
- WSU: There were 239 enrolments for the Water Safety Awareness Program in the region which was 11.92% of enrolments in the program. Our Emergency Care sessions were conducted at the Birth and Beyond Parent Centre in Alice Springs.
- Education: 10 Water Safety Education talks were conducted within the region reaching 836 students. Sessions were delivered at childcare centres, preschools and primary schools.
- IAS: Swim, Survive and Strive programmes were delivered in 5 communities Mt Leibig, Santa Teresa, Mutitjulu, Areyonga and Yuendumu. At each location, the week's lessons culminated in a Pool Lifesaving carnival being held.
- Sport: There are 22 active Pool Lifesaving members in Central Australia, with 12 new members and 10 returning.
 This is an increase on last year. Pool Lifesaving members in Central Australia have benefitted from the stability of securing casual coaching staff.
- Community Events: Royal Life Saving NT was involved in 18 community events within Central Australia reaching 1,159 people. The engagement numbers were decreased significantly due to the cancellation of major events in Central Australia in 2020. Innovative events have helped RLSSANT maintain a presence in the Red Centre

Swim and Survive

Swim and Survive is a comprehensive swimming and water safety initiative of Royal Life Saving that increases the swimming and water safety skills of Territory children. It aims to prevent drowning and increase participation in safe aquatic activities. Swim and Survive teaches essential components of personal survival, basic water rescue and water safety, in addition to a process of developing strong and effective swimming techniques. The program enables children from 6 months to 14 years to progress through three, age specific award levels: Wonder, Courage and Active.

This year 14,277 children from urban, regional and remote Northern Territory participated in the Swim and Survive Program, an 15.9% increase from the previous year, refer Appendix 2: Swim & Survive Certificates Issued The community has the opportunity to access the program through our School Swim and Survive Program, Swim and Survive Partners, the Swim, Survive & Strive Program in remote communities and our Sunday Lifesaving and Vacswim programs. We continue to work with stakeholders to increase the number of students to meet the National Benchmark of Swim and Survive. This year 1109 children reached an Active Award Level 4 or above, representing 7.8% of all participants, a 2% increase from the previous year.

School communities, the Northern Territory Department of Education and our Swim and Survive Partners continue to play a fundamental role in the continued success of the Swim and Survive Program. 78 Government and Non-Government schools acknowledged the important life skills that the Swim and Survive program provides by including the program as part of their school curriculum, refer Appendix 3: Swim & Survive Schools. Department of Education Certificate Funding

The Northern Territory Government, Department of Education continues to support Royal Life Saving NT and Government school students with its certificate funding.

This year 7259 Government school students from 62 schools received certificates including 1433 Remote students.

This year also saw 337 students achieving a Swim and Survive Active Level 4 or above. This represents 5.2% of attending Government school students.





Swim and Survive Partner

Royal Life Saving NT is supported by 21 Swim and Survive Partners and Schools that are recognised as a preferred deliverer of the Swim and Survive Program. Some long-standing partners include Marianne's Swimming School, Goldfishbowl Swim School, Swim Dynamics and Alice Springs Aquatic and Leisure Centre. Government and independent schools in Darwin, Alice Springs and Katherine also deliver the program to their students as a part of their school curriculum.

Royal Life Saving NT would like to thank the new partners who have come on board to be a part of delivering a quality swimming and water safety program to Territory students. New partners include Triple S Swim School, Splash Academy Alyangula, Batchelor Swim School and YMCA (Katherine region).

A highlight of the year was establishing two remote swim schools in Borroloola and Maningrida, run by indigenous people for indigenous people. These swim schools will deliver a program at their local facility each semester so students, who need it the most, are getting ongoing and consistent swimming and water safety lessons.

This year saw 2783 children participate in the Swim and Survive program through the 21 Swim and Survive Schools and Partners. This represents 20% of all participants. We continue to work with our Swim and Survive Partners to assist them in providing the best quality program to their students and aim to increase the benefits to our partners into

Sunday Life & VACSWIM Programs

Royal Life Saving NT is committed to providing access to swimming and lifesaving to all community members through the Sunday Life Saving Program and VACSWIM programs at Parap & Nightcliff Swimming Pools.

Our Sunday Life Saving Program allows children from 5 years - 15 years to participate in the Active Awards of the Swim and Survive program, along with the Rescue and Bronze Awards, as their skills develop. This year 156 children participated in this program.

The VACSWIM intensive Swim and Survive program is held each year in the October and January school holidays. The VACSWIM program includes daily swimming and water safety lessons, basic First Aid training, Resuscitation Awareness training, amazing race challenges and a Pool Lifesaving Sport Carnival to allow the students to show off their newly acquired skills. A total of 65 students participated in the VACSWIM intensive Swim and Survive Program

Swim My Way Fund

Developed by UNCLE TOBYS in partnership with the Royal Life Saving Society - Australia, SWIM MY WAY, is supporting a variety of swimming programs for Australians of all ages. It's designed to promote access and inclusion to get more Aussies active, having fun and growing their confidence in the water. A massive thank you to UNCLE TOBYS and the Swim My Way fund for supporting the delivery of the following 3 programs: Watiyawanu School - Swim, Survive & Snorkel, Territorian Multicultural Families Learn to Swim Program and Darwin's Adult Multicultural Learn to Swim Program.

The Watiyawanu School - Swim, Survive & Snorkel program targeted indigenous students from the remote community of Watiyawanu. Also identified as Mt Liebig, the community is situated 300km from Alice Springs, students are unable to access safe swimming areas around their community. The Watiyawanu School hopes for a group of students to attend a camp to the Great Barrier reef once restrictions on interstate travel have eased. The program will help to build their skills and knowledge in anticipation of this camp. To facilitate this Royal Life Saving NT, in conjunction with Alice Springs Aquatic Leisure Centre, held two water safety excursions for 27 indigenous students. Held in November and March, the students from years 4 to 6 made the three hour journey into Alice Springs to learn everything water safety. These intensive three day excursions included eight sessions of the Swim & Survive Program, a Pool Lifesaving Carnival, snorkelling skills and the delivery of CPR awareness to all students. Working with our Swim & Survive Partner in Alice Springs, ASALC, the funding provided a safe, fun and well-structured water safety program to children who are not normally exposed to safe aquatic environments.

The Territorian Multicultural Families Learn to Swim Program was conducted at Parap and Palmerston pools. This allowed for participants from lower socioeconomic families across Darwin & Palmerston to gain access to the program. The twelve lesson Swim & Survive program throughout October and November had participants of varying age groups and multicultural backgrounds. 41 parents, children and extended family members received an opportunity to participate in their first swimming and water safety program. Swimming skills, supervision of children in and around water, restricting access, water familiarisation and basic resuscitation information were all key components of the program. A big thank you to the Multicultural Council of NT, Catholic Care NT, Palmerston Child and Family Centre & Playgroup NT for their support to make this program happen.

The Darwin Adult Multicultural Learn to Swim program was held in Darwin over the months of June and July 2021. Teaming up with Charles Darwin University and the Melaleuca Refugee Centre, 37 adults from multicultural backgrounds, mostly from the Indian and Nepalese communities participated in the learn to swim program. Throughout the six week program these adults learnt essential components of personal survival and water safety, finishing the program with CPR awareness. Several swimmers excelled through the program, starting at Level 1 and finishing at Level 3 in the Swim & Survive Program. Extended family members also benefited from these programs as they observed from pool side and gained knowledge of water safety knowledge without entering the water.

Pool Lifesaving Sport

The Australian Pool Lifesaving Championships 2021 (APLSC 2021) were to be held at the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra in January 2021 however a decision was taken to postpone the Championships for 2021.

A revised sports plan was implemented after the Northern Territory's lockdown was lifted in June 2020.

Semester 2 training commenced in August 2020 and RLSSANT conducted 22 grassroots carnivals in the NT during the year. Alyangula, Alice Springs, Areyonga, Batchelor, Daly River, Darwin, Gunbalunya, Jabiru, Ngukurr, Nhulunbuy, Tennant Creek, Wattie Creek, and Yuendumu, all hosted pool lifesaving carnivals with over 900 community members participating.

Participation

Athlete participation numbers in both the Darwin and Alice Springs clubs increased throughout 2020/2021. Alice Springs reached a 5 year high in athlete attendance. Dry season training in Alice Springs proved successful throughout May and June 2021. The Junior Development program is important to ensure the future of pool lifesaving as a sport in the NT.

The Sport Development team will continue to progress the junior pool lifesaving squads in both Darwin and Alice Springs, along with the fostering of a new development club in partnership with the Nhulunbuy Amateur Swimming Club. This will be done through the link between the Swim & Survive program and an increased promotion of the sport. The junior development program is important to maintain to ensure the future of pool lifesaving as a sport.

NORTHERN TERRITORY POOL LIFE SAVING TEAM 2022

Pool Lifesaving in Sport and Recreation

The NT Government fund Royal Life Saving NT as a Sport Service Provider to grow the sport of Pool Life Saving in the Northern Territory, develop athlete and offical pathways and provide community engagment activities and events.

Active Family Fun days were held in Darwin and Alice Springs with 288 participants. Pool Life Saving carnivals were conducted in Darwin, Jabiru, Nhulunbuy, Tennant Creek and Alice Springs with 449 participants. Regional development programs were conducted in Kalkarindji, Areyonga, Yuendumu, Ngukurr, Daly River, Gunbalunya, Alyangula and Batchelor with 492 participants. The athlete development pathways assists opportunities from grass roots to National competitions and is valued by all Members.

Pool Lifesaving Regional and Remote

Pool Lifesaving carnivals were conducted in conjunction with our Swim, Strive & Survive swimming programs. The carnivals were conducted for Watiyawanu School, Milingimbi School, Groote Island - Alyangula Area School, Alyangula - Angurugu School, Daly River (Woolianna School), Yuendumu School, Ngukurr, Areyonga School, Kintore, Mt Liebig & Yirrara Schools, Gunbalanya School, Santa Teresa School, Tennant Creek - Canteen Creek, Rocky Downs Station, Nhulunbuy - Yirrkala School.

Nhulunbuy Pool Lifesaving Carnival April 2021

A community pool lifesaving carnival was conducted in Gove with the assistance from the Nhulunbuy Amateur Swimming Club coaches.

Over 50 community members participated in the Pool Lifesaving Carnival. The children of the community really enjoyed the competitve nature of the Pool Lifesaving Carnival and some natural talent was exposed as a result of the carnival.





Community Programs

Little Royals Swim School

Darwin 2020/2021

Love of the water in a safe environment for the youngest members of our Community is at the centre of the Little Royals Swim School. Three six-week programs were held in 2020/21. The programs were conducted at Nightcliff Pool and Parap Pool.

Additionally, a trial program was conducted with the Family's as First Teachers Ludmilla group, at the Ludmilla Language Centre's Pool.

The programs were very popular with mums, dads, grandparents, carers and of course the infants themselves.

172 children participated in the four programs; this is an 59% increase on the previous year.

A special acknowledgement must be paid to the wonderful AUSTSWIM Infant qualified swim teachers who make these Programs such an enjoyable experience for all involved. This year our swim teachers were Floss Roberts, Tiarne Vella-Hunt, Jess Patterson, Samantha Cooper, Samuel Bricknell and Gabby Sutton.



Katherine 2020/2021

Little Royals Swim School Katherine held two six-week programs during 2020-2021. These programs were extremely popular with the families of Katherine. The programs were conducted at the Katherine Town pool.

154 children participated in the two programs. The children's ages ranged from 6 months to 10 years.

A special acknowledgement must be made to our amazing AUSTSWIM Infant qualified swim teacher, Brogen Barrington, who made the program such an enjoyable experience for all children and families involved.



Batchelor 2020/2021

Little Royals Swim School Batchelor ran a 4-week swimming program in Term 1 2021.

The program was held at the Batchelor town pool, every Sunday throughout March.

The program was welcomed by the community.

16 children participated in the March 2021 program. The program saw new families join the Sunday lessons, along with many returning students travelling from Adelaide River.

Programs for Access & Inclusion



Royal Life Saving NT has continued to support Total Recreation with their Sports in Schools program. This program gives students with a disability, in mainstream schools, the opportunity to participate in a tailor-made swimming program. Historically the program is conducted over two six week blocks, although this year, due to funding challenges only one program was held in 2020. 81 students participated in learning vital swimming and lifesaving skills. The program was a great success and ended on a high, with a modified swimming carnival which included students from other schools. The students were able to interact, participate and support others who wouldn't normally have the opportunity to participate in a swimming program.

Adults

Royal Life Saving NT once again engaged with our adult population through targeted programs in Darwin, Palmerston and Alice Springs. This included both new Australians and adults who were looking to improve their swimming and lifesaving skills.

A total of 134 adults participated during the four programs held in October to December and February to March. Thanks to the staff at Casuarina, Parap and Palmerston Swimming Pool for your continued support of these valued programs.

Cool Seniors & Grey Medallion

Senior Territorians have access to a variety of different activities during Senior's Month held in August each year. Royal Life Saving NT aims to engage Senior Territorians by introducing them to the Grey Medallion program. This program increases water awareness, fitness and wellbeing. 4 Seniors completed their Grey Medallion qualification in 2020/21.



The Cool Seniors program allows Senior Territorians to access swimming, aquatic exercise and connection. The program aims to increase fitness and water confidence amongst the most senior members of our community. The program continues to be popular with 69 participants over the 5 weeks of the program in 2021/21.

Darwin Youth Funding

RLSSANT received funding from the Office of Youth Affairs which enabled an exciting, new school holiday aquatic education program to be offered. What's SUP on the Water? was introduced this year. Targeting both male and females aged 14 - 17, the program allowed young people to participate in bronze medallion training, enhance their personal survival skills and techniques in addition to participating in extracurricular activities such as fishing, stand up paddle boarding and recreating at different aquatic locations. The third program also incorporated a focus on employment outcomes resulting from achieving a Bronze Medallion and included visits to Northern Territory Water Police and Northern Territory Fire and Rescue Services.

Over the course of 3 programs a total of 38 participants completed the course with 31 bronze medallion and 38 CPR certificates issued. The program was well received by participants with positive feedback and also generated engagement with young people on social media via Facebook and Instagram.



Online Accreditation – Coaching, Officiating and Professional **Development Program**

Thanks to funding provided by the Department of Tourism, Sport and Culture, Royal Life Saving NT was able to provide a Coaching, Officiating and Professional Development program for our casual employees throughout the Covid-19 pandemic. The online accreditation program consisted of First Aid certification through the RLSSANT e-learning portal and a 3-year subscription to Royal Life Saving Australia's National Sports Hub online platform.

12 casual swim teachers accessed the First Aid course online and gained the qualification through online learning modules and an assessment provided by a RLSSANT trainer.

17 casual swim teachers were subscribed to the Royal Life Saving Australia's National Sports Hub platform, a subscription-based e-learning platform which delivers many online coaching and officiating courses for Aquatic Sports, specifically pool lifesaving.

This online program was well received by the casual swim teachers as it enabled upskilling and professional development in their knowledge and proficiency in implementing pool lifesaving in swim and survive programs and exposed them to the officiating skills required across the sport of pool lifesaving.

Royal Life Saving NT acknowledges the strong support of the Northern Territory Government's commitment to drowning prevention in the Northern Territory.

Water Wellbeing Program

Thanks to the - Online Activity Recreation Program funding provided by the Department of Tourism, Sport and Culture, Royal Life Saving NT was able to develop and deliver an online Water Wellbeing Program. This was in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, which saw the suspension of formal delivery of sport and active recreation in the Northern Territory (NT).



The online 10-part series included a range of water safety and awareness education sessions, land/water-based fitness workouts and several aquatic safety/rescue skillsets that were recorded and uploaded weekly.

The purpose of the series was to provide online water safety education, fitness and wellbeing development throughout the pandemic.

A social media group was created to host the weekly sessions and a dedicated YouTube channel was formed to allow ease of access and engagement from the wider Northern Territory (NT) community.

The fun and informative 30-minute sessions were well received by participants with positive feedback. 61 community members participated, and each received a certificate of completion at the end of the program.

A big thank you to Cieran New and Jaz Cross who delivered and filmed the entire series.

Royal Life Saving NT acknowledges the strong support of the Northern Territory Government's commitment to drowning prevention in the Northern Territory.

Multicultural Swimming and Water Safety Program

Thanks to funding provided by The Office of Multicultural Affairs, Royal Life Saving NT was able to provide a much-needed swimming and water safety program for multicultural families across Darwin and Palmerston. The 6-week program was conducted at Parap and Palmerston pools which enabled lower socioeconomic families across Darwin & Palmerston to gain access to the program. Having the swimming program conducted at two different facilities eased travel restrictions for the families.

41 participants including parents, children and extended family members were given the opportunity to participate in their first water safety/swimming program. Swimming skills, supervision of children in and around water, restricting access, water familiarisation and basic resuscitation information were all key components of the program. 95% of all participating families had never experienced a structured swimming program previously.

The program was well received by the families with positive feedback, with parents saying that they were grateful for the opportunity.





Water Safety Awareness Program

What is the Water Safety Awareness Program?

The Water Safety Awareness Program consists of five free water safety classes for the parents and guardians of children aged less than five years old who reside in the Northern Territory. The Program is funded through the NT Government's Department of Tourism and Culture - Sport and Active Recreation and is implemented by Royal Life Saving Society (Australia) NT Branch Inc. The first session, Emergency Care, is designed to give families a basic awareness of the specific risk factors in and around water for children and some basic instruction in resuscitation skills. Families must attend the first session before they can access the rest of the Program. The four in-water classes are then delivered by AUSTSWIM accredited Teachers of Infants and Preschool Aquatics to ensure the highest quality and standard of instruction. Each year, over 2000 children enrol in the Program.

Why was the Water Safety Awareness Program started?

The Water Safety Awareness Program was introduced in the Northern Territory at a time when it had a drowning rate of three times the national average. In the nine years prior to the Program's commencement 35 children aged less than five drowned in the Northern Territory. Children were drowning in backyard swimming pools, wading pools, lakes, storm water drains and other natural bodies of water.

What has the Water Safety Awareness Program Achieved?

The Water Safety Awareness Program has been highly successful at achieving its core goal of reducing the number of children under five who have drowned in the Northern Territory. Up until June 30, 2021, 28,113 children have enrolled in the Program; and of those children, 75% have completed all five sessions of the Program. The Program is very popular with Northern Territory families. As part of the continuous improvement evaluations, the feedback from families for this Government initiative has been consistently positive, with the Program seen to be a practical and appropriate solution to a real concern for families.

The Year that was for The Water Safety Awareness Program

A total of 2004 enrolments were received in 2020/2021 with 75% voucher usage.

The NT Government Learn to Swim Voucher continues to be an excellent complement to the Water Safety Awareness Program. The Water Safety Awareness Program provides parents and carers with the initial valuable water safety education. Territory families can then access ongoing swimming lessons whereas previously they may not have been able to afford them without the use of the Learn to Swim voucher.

Current providers of the "water sessions" across the Northern Territory

All Providers undergo a venue safety checklist, hold current qualifications, working with children clearances and have a clear understanding of the deliverables for each session as per the guidelines agreed upon. During 2020/2021 fifteen swim schools across the Northern Territory provided the Water Safety Awareness Program.

Remote Access



Water Safety Week 2020

Water Safety Week 2020 was conducted from September 20-26, featuring a varied program of events and activities throughout the Northern Territory (NT). The slogan for Water Safety Week 2020 was 'SPLASH ON!'. This year the focus was on water safety whilst recreating. The event was promoted through print, radio, television and social media. In addition to this, promotion was also undertaken by Northern Territory Water Safety Advisory Council member networks.

Splashfest' was the opening event of WSW20 and took place from 9:00am – 12:00pm on Sunday September 20 at the Darwin Waterfront Precinct. Approximately 3,500 people attended. The Honourable Kate Worden MLA attended Splashfest and enjoyed the stalls and information on display. Her Honour the Honourable Vicki O'Halloran AO, Administrator of the NT was also on hand to officiate the "Rescue a Friend" races.




- Community Pool Lifesaving carnival held at Parap Pool, hosted by Royal Life Saving Society.

- Splashfest held at the Darwin Waterfront, hosted by the Northern Territory Government.
- Aquafest held at the Palmerston Aquatic & Leisure Centre hosted by the YMCA and the City of Palmerston

An estimated 10,000 Territorians received water safety messages throughout Water Safety Week in 2020.









Pipes and Drains Campaign 2020/2021

The Pipes and Drains campaign was launched on December 1, 2020. Most parts of the Northern Territory recorded above average rainfall during the wet season and a total rainfall of 1857.8 mm was recorded. The campaign of 2019/20 was used once again due to the success of the "shock" value the campaign had brought in the previous year.

The television and social media campaigns were managed by Royal Life Saving NT. The City of Darwin and the City of Palmerston contributed to the campaign in the community. Snapback hats, spinner pens & slap bands containing USBs, formed the collateral for the campaign. All schools in the Darwin and Palmerston region were contacted regarding the campaign and free Pipes and Drains talks were offered to their students. 10 schools participated in the education sessions which reached 1975 students. In addition to this, 5 community events were attended which directly targeted the Pipes & Drains message with an estimated reach over 5,000 members of the community. Channel 10 aired the Pipes and Drains TVC from December 2020 – February 2021. 7 banners were displayed across 6 locations throughout the campaign. Messages conveyed to members of the community and students during the campaign included:

- During the Wet, water conditions can change quickly
- You can find yourself in a life-threatening situation in seconds
- Water can be dangerous
- No one can hear you scream when you drown

Water Safety Talks in Schools 2020/2021

During 2020-2021, 32 schools were visited by the Water Safety Unit to deliver water safety talks to 3446 students across the Northern Territory.

The water safety talks covered topics including supervision, safe swimming areas, marine creatures, safety signs, Pipes and Drains and Boating safety. The format of the delivery of the talks was tailored to meet the different school's needs. Some talks were delivered in an assembly forum whilst others were delivered in a classroom format. All talks were well received by staff and students at the schools visited. The visits provided a great opportunity for students to interact with the Water Safety Unit Team around water safety.

The talks provided students with the opportunity to share their personal experiences, try on and use boating safety equipment, observe marine creatures and watch YouTube clips around Pipes and Drains safety messages. The diversity of the delivery ensured all students were able to receive a benefit from the water safety messages.

Keep Watch

Keep Watch is a public education program of Royal Life Saving Society - Australia, aimed at preventing drowning deaths of children under 5 years of age in all aquatic locations. The Keep Watch program has 4 key actions which parents and carers are encouraged to undertake to prevent their child from drowning. These actions are not to be used in isolation and should form part of a web of prevention measures. Therefore if one line of defence fails there are more prevention measures working together to prevent their child from drowning.



These actions are:

- Supervise
- Restrict Access
- Water Awareness
- Resuscitate

Keep Watch Ambassadors agree to act as a community contact point and distribution centre for information on preventing toddler drowning. Thank you to our NT Ambassadors for their commitment to drowning prevention strategies for parents and carers of young children.

Royal Life Saving Society Northern Territory received annual funding to continue to expand on its goals for indigenous communities through the Remote Swim, Survive & Strive Project. On behalf of Royal Life Saving Society Northern Territory and the communities who benefit, we thank the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet for the opportunity to continue assisting these indigenous communities.

The Remote Swim, Survive & Strive Project delivers the Swim & Survive program, Indigenous employment, AUSTSWIM Mentoring program, lifesaving education and recreational sporting programs, Indigenous aquatic training, VET in schools and the establishment of learn to swim business models in remote communities. It extends to 26 remote Indigenous communities, utilising 21 locations.



Remote Swim, Survive & Strive Project allows students who live in remote locations, who do not have access to qualified swimming instructors, the opportunity to learn about being safe in, on and around the aquatic environment. Most visits are conducted during the school terms and in many situations the whole school will be taught each day, this may include up to 150 students. Teaching the children every day, for up to 10 days allows skills to be reinforced and built upon. This also incorporates dry, in class, sessions for schools and their students who, this year, are unable to access a safe water environment.

The project also identifies local indigenous people to participate in the indigenous AUSTSWIM mentoring program. This training allows local members of the community to become AUSTSWIM qualified swimming instructors who can potentially provide quality, ongoing swimming lessons to their community. In Tennant Creek, 3 people completed their AUSTSWIM Teacher of Swimming & Water Safety award while 5 others continue to work towards the completion of their qualification.

In many communities a barbeque was hosted at the pool for one afternoon. During this time a Pool Lifesaving Carnival was held to introduce the sport to community members. This year 695 indigenous youth participated in a Pool Lifesaving Carnival in their community. The sport and BBQ are provided to the whole community and aim to promote the pool as the social hub. Promoting the pool as a place where families can come together and feel like they are in a fun and safe environment.

Swim & Survive



Employment, Training and AUSTSWIM Mentoring Program

Indigenous people gained employment as a direct result of the project

Rangers from Maningrida, Umbakumba, Alyangula, Angurugu & Milyakburra have participated in the Swim, Survive & Strive Project

Royal Life Saving Society Northern Territory aims to develop skills and empower local people in communities to gain employment through aquatic pathways. Allowing them to develop and maintain their community's swimming pool and take ownership of their Swim and Survive Program. This ownership will result in longer lasting outcomes, not a once-a-year activity. This year, 35 indigenous people gained employment through the training and mentoring of the Swim, Survive & Strive Project. Along with 61 indigenous people who are currently employed within their community and received ongoing professional development. 341 students and adults completed a range of training through the project.

43 Indigenous Rangers from Maningrida, Galiwinku, Umbakumba, Alyangula, Angurugu & Milyakburra took part in the project. Working with each individual ranger group, we developed training plans to cater to their goals and objectives. Junior Sea Rangers from Umbakumba, Angurugu & Milyakburra travelled to Alyangula to upskill in resuscitation and received their level 4 in the Swim & Survive Program. Without these skills students are unable to continue in the ranger program, as it is a minimum requirement. This Swim, Survive & Strive project allows remote students to continue their learning in maritime navigation and the ability to gain workplace skills in the maritime industry.

The Year's Highlight

Homeland School Strives with Swim & Survive

It had been 7 years in between Swim & Survive programs for the students of Laynhapuy Homelands School. Located on the saltwater land of the East Arnhem Region, Laynhapuy Homelands School encompasses many homelands coming together to live and learn.

Children from the communities of Dhalinybuy, Gangan, Rorruwuy & Wandawuy, all located in Northeast Arnhem Land. Travelled the approximate three hours to the township of Nhulunbuy, to participate in a 2 day intensive program.

A total of 19 year 11 and 12 students showcased their swimming abilities and survival skills in the pool. The students learnt about spinal injury management, adorning a lifejacket and the different entries and exits in different bodies of water. This training prepared them for their Maritime Program assessment in Term 3 2021.

The last time the school had participated in a program like this, was in 2014 where the project team hosted 14 students for another 2 day program. The homeland students travelled into Nhulunbuy to participate and compete in a swimming carnival with the Yirrkala School with great success.









Inland Waterways and Drowning Prevention Program

The Inland Waterways Program, including: Make the Right Call, Beriversafe and Respect the River Campaigns has engaged with 600 participants and continues to work extensively throughout the Northern Territory. The campaign is delivered in Katherine, Darwin, Tennant Creek and Alice Springs.

Highlights included:

- 8 river safety picnics, 8 community events with 183 particpants
- 16 Kalkarindji students travel to Katherine and participate in a Swim & Survive Program and CPR awareness
- 44 Melaleuca students from Melaleuca Refugess centre particpate in a Swim & Survive Program in Darwin and Palmerston

The messages are consistent:

- Be Riversafe
- Make the right Call
- If it's flooded, forget it.

The program also reached out to males to look after each other and "make the right call" when they are in, on and around water.

Royal Life Saving NT in the media

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 30 June 2021

The financial statements cover Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. ("the Association") as an individual entity. Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. is a not-for-profit Association, registered and domiciled in Australia.

The functional and presentation currency of Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. is Australian dollars. Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Statement of compliance

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Act Northern Territory and Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012. TheCommittee has determined that Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. is not a reporting entity and is a not-for-profit entity because in the Board's opinion there are unlikely to exist users who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs.

The special purpose financial report has been prepared in accordance with the basis of preparation and accounting policies described below. Australian Accounting Standards Board, (AASBs) adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ("AASB"), and other authoritative pronouncements of the AASB have not been complied with except to the extent stated below.

(b) Basis of preparation

The financial report is presented in Australian dollars and has been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

The preparation of a financial report in conformity with Australian Accounting Standards requires the Association to make judgements, estimates and assumption that affect the application of policies and reported amounts as assets and liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making the judgements about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates. These accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Association.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The special purpose financial report has been prepared on accrual basis.

(c) Income tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

1 Significant Accounting Policies - continued

(d) Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Association and specific criteria relating to the type of income as noted

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Grant Income

Revenue from grants and donations have been recognised when any associated performance obligation to provide goods or services is satisfied, and not immediately upon receipt.

Grants that have an enforceable agreement but no specific performance obligations but have restrictions on the timing of expenditure will also continue to be recognised on receipt as time restriction on the use of funds is not sufficiently specific to create a performance obligation.

Grants that are not enforceable and/or not sufficiently specific will not qualify for deferral, and continue to be recognised as revenue as soon as they are controlled.

Grants that require the Association to perform services or provide facilities, or to meet eligibility criteria are recognised as income only to the extent that the services required have been performed or the eligibility criteria have been satisfied. When monies received have been paid in advance of performance or eligibility, a liability is rec-

Any unexpended grants associated with performance obligations are recognised as a liability in the Statement of Financial Position.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated reliably then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognisedthat are recoverable.

Subscriptions

Revenue from the provision of membership subscriptions is recognised on receipt.

Interest income

Interest received from term deposits is accrued over the term of the investment.

Donations

Donations are recognised as revenues when the Association obtains control over the assets comprising the donations. Control over donated assets is normally obtained upon their receipt or upon prior notification that a donation has been secured.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Association is entitled to it.

1 Significant Accounting Policies - continued

(e) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), exceptwhere the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(f) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Items of property, plant and equipment acquired for nil or nominal consideration have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

Assets measured using the revaluation model are carried at fair value at the revaluation date less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Revaluations are performed whenever there is a material movement in the value of an asset under the revaluation model.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

Leased assets and leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or their estimated useful life.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

(g) Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

(i) Initial recognition

The Association initially recognises loans and advances and deposits from members, on the date these transactions are originated. All other financial assets and financial liabilities (including financial assets and financial liabilities designated at fair value through profit and loss) are initially recognised on trade date when the related contractual rights or obligations exist.

(ii) De-recognition

The Association de-recognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows on the financial asset in a transaction in which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred. Any interest in transferred financial assets that is created or retained by the Association is recognised as a separate asset or liability. The Association de recognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled or when they expire.

(iii) Off-setting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are set off and the net amount presented in the Statement of Financial Position when, and only when, the Association has a legal right to set off the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. Income and expenses are presented on a net basis only when permitted by the accounting standards, or for gains and losses arising from a group of similar transactions.

(iv) Amortised cost measurement

The amortised cost of a financial asset or financial liability is the amount at which the financial asset or financial liability is measured at initial recognition, minus principal repayments, plus or minus the cumulative amortisation using the effective interest method of any difference between the initial amount recognised and the maturity amount, minus any reduction for impairment.

(v) Identification and measurement of impairment

Refer below for details.

Application

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, unrestricted balances held in banks and highly liquid financial assets with original maturities of less than three months, which are subject to insignificant risks of changes in their value, and are used by the Association in the management of its short-term commitments. Cash and cash equivalents are carried at amortised cost in the Statement of Financial Position.

1 Significant Accounting Policies - continued

(g) Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities - continued

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any provision for expected credit losses (ECLs). Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Trade and other payables

Liabilities for trade creditors and other amounts are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the Association.

Impairment on financial assets

The Association recognises an allowance for ECLs for trade and other receivables. ECLs are based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Association expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate. The expected cash flows will include cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

ECLs are recognised in two stages. For credit exposures for which there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, ECLs are provided for credit losses that result from default events that are possible within the next 12-months (a 12-month ECL). For those credit exposures for which there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is required for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure, irrespective of the timing of the default (a lifetime ECL).

For trade and other receivables, the Association applies a simplified approach in calculating ECLs. Therefore, the Association does not track changes in credit risk, but instead recognises a loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date. The Association has a provision matrix that is based on its historical credit loss experience, adjusted for forward-looking factors specific to the debtors and the economic environment.

(h) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cashflows are discounted using market yields on high quality corporate bond rates incorporating bonds rated AAA or AA by credit agencies, with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cashflows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

1 Significant Accounting Policies - continued

(i) Right of use Assets

The Association assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

The Association applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets. The Association recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and right-of-use assets representing the right to use the underlying assets.

Right-of-use assets

The Association recognises right-of-use assets at the commencement date of the lease (i.e., the date the underlying asset is available for use). Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. The cost of right-of-use assets includes the amount of lease liabilities recognised, initial direct costs incurred, and lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease term and the estimated useful lives of the assets. The right-of-use assets are also subject to impairment. Refer to the accounting policies in section h for impairment of assets (excluding financial assets).

Lease liabilities

At the commencement date of the lease, the Association recognises lease liabilities measured at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments include fixed payments (including insubstance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, and amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees.

In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Association uses its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. After the commencement date, the amount of lease liabilities is increased to reflect the accretion of interest and reduced for the lease payments made. In addition, the carrying amount of lease liabilities is remeasured if there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in the lease payments (e.g., changes to future payments resulting from a change in an index or rate used to determine such lease payments) or a change in the assessment of an option to purchase the underlying asset.

Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Association applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term leases of machinery and equipment (i.e., those leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option). It also applies the lease of low-value assets recognition exemption to leases of office equipment that are considered to be low value. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

1 Significant Accounting Policies - continued

(j) Economic Dependence and Going Concern

Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. is dependent on the support of various Northern Territory Government Departments for the majority of its revenue used to operate the business. At the date of this report, the committee have no reason to believe this support will not continue into the future.

This financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis which contemplates continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business. The ability of the Association to continue to operate as a going concern is dependent upon the ability of the Association to generate sufficient cash flows from operations to meet its liabilities. The Committee of the Association believe that the going concern assumption is appropriate.

(k) Comparatives

Comparative figures are, where appropriate, reclassified so as to be comparable with the figures presented for the current financial year.

2 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

Those charged with governance make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates. The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Key estimates - Trade receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

13 Contingent Liabilitie

Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. had the following contingent liability at the end of the reporting period:

Water Safety Awareness Program

The Association receives funding to provide the 'Water Safety Awareness Program (WSAP)'. The WSAP provides registered children, under the age of five years, with vouchers for the free attendance at five WSAP sessions. On the attainment of age five these vouchers expire. Each funded voucher has a face value of \$12.50.

The Association physically receives the funding for the entire year's program at the commencement of each financial year. At the conclusion of each financial year the Association reconciles the unpresented, unexpired vouchers. At 30 June 2021 the number of unpresented, unexpired vouchers were 2021: 34,436 (2020: 28,743 2019: 23,638, 2018: 18,437). The funded face value these vouchers is 2021: \$430,450(2020: \$359,288, 2019: \$295,475, 2018: \$230,463).

On review of the total vouchers presented during the year, it was established that 2021: 4,633 (2020: 4,695, 2019: 6,010, 2018: 7,035) vouchers were utilised during the current year. Included in this balance were 2021: 1,195 (2020: 1,289, 2019: 1,154, 2018: 1,896, 2017: 360) vouchers which were written back as expired, being 2021: 26% (2020:27%, 2019: 19%, 2018: 27%) of the total number of vouchers utilised.

Historically, there has been significant probability that a material number of these outstanding vouchers would expire without being utilised. As such, the recognition of this liability in the Statement of Financial Position has not been considered appropriate. This assessment will be reconsidered in the next 12 months as utilisation of the vouchers continues to fluctuate significantly year on year.

Independent auditor's report to the members of Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. Auditor's Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report of Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. ("the Association"), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2021, and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows for the year then ended, a summary of significant accounting policies, other explanatory notes and the Statement by the Committee.

In our opinion, the special purpose financial report has been prepared in accordance with Division 60 of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 and the Associations Act NT, including:

- (a) giving a true and fair view of the Association's financial position as at 30 June 2021 and of its financial performance for the year then ended; and
- (b) complying with Australian Accounting Standards to the extent described in Note 1, and Division 60 the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013 and Associations Act NT.

Basis for Auditor's Opinion

The financial report has been prepared to assist Royal Life Saving Society (Aust) NT Branch Inc. meet the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not for profits Commission Act 2012, Associations Act NT and the Association's constitution. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of these matters.

Other Matter

The financial report of the Association for the year ended 30 June 2020 was audited by another auditor who expressed a modified opinion on that report on 31 August 2020.

The Responsibility of the Committee for the Financial Report

The Association's Committee is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements, and has determined that the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, are appropriate to meet the financial reporting requirements of the Australian Charities and Not for profits Commission Act 2012, Associations Act NT and the Association's Constitution and are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The Committee's responsibility also includes such internal control as the Committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.



In preparing the financial report, the Committee is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Committee either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report
